BRITT UNABLE TO CONTINUE

Chick Scores Upset Win Over Title Holder; Belcastro Ousted.

Cowboy Dude Chick, Klamath Falls' most consistent winner, jumped into the top rank of the country's junior heavyweights at the armory last night with an upset victory over Alvin Britt, the champion recognized by the National Wrestling association.

The coup-puncher from Wyoming defeated the champion in a non-title main event. Both grapplers were over the 190-pound limit of the junior heavy-weight division.

Victory Comes As Surprise As outstanding as Chick is as a wrestler, even the most loyal of his Klamath supporters expected him to succumb to the "big" wizardry of the athlete from the Kansas wheat farm.

Chick, pulled to his feet by another chinlock during the second period, slipped his shoulders under Britt's body. In a moment he had him spinning.

Belcastro Ruled Out Chick's fall was accomplished in 12 minutes and 55 seconds. A crowd equal to any seen at the armory this season witnessed the match.

Pete Belcastro's temper and unclean wrestling cost him the semi-windup match with Prince Mihalakis. Belcastro was disqualified by Referee Ray Frisbie after each wrestler had won one fall.
