Coyotes Taken—A total of 38 adult coyotes and 18 pups and one bobcat, were taken in Klamath county by predatory animal hunters during the month of May, according to the regular report from Roy Fugate of Portland, who is in charge of the state predatory animal control work under the U. S. biological survey. One hunter for Klamath county sheepmen took 14 adult coyotes, and 18 pups. In addition to the regular hunters employed by the U. S. B. B., there are two in Klamath county employed by county funds, and one by the sheepmen. The WPA contributes some funds, as well as hunters to the project.
