

RISE IN WHEAT PRICES CHECKED

CHICAGO, June 17. (AP)—Enlarged offerings on price advances assuaged the wheat market late today despite estimates that crop losses in the Dakotas and Montana aggregate 52,000,000 bushels.

Rising prices were checked by word that the Minneapolis market had reached a basis allowing renewal of imports of wheat from Canada. On today's upturn, December wheat in Chicago attained a new high price record for the season.

Wheat closed unsettled at the same as yesterday's finish to 1 lower, July 88-89, Sept. 89-90; 1-corn 4-4 advanced, Sept. 50-51; oats 4-4 up, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 30 cents.

NEW YORK, June 17. (AP)—Rally and a few industrial specialties were market ring-leaders today running forward fractions to about 3 points or so. The closing tone was irregular. Transfers approximated 1,150,000 shares.

The irregularity of groups, high-lighted by random selective buying, was seen by analysts as symptomatic of various uncertainties yet to be settled.

Steels dragged, utilities were active but narrow and prominent industrial shares showed financial sentiment to be about a standoff.

Cases, a recent high-flyer on the upside, slumped more than 4. Up fractions to more than a point were Chrysler, Woolworth, American Telephone, International Telephone, National Distillers, Sperry, Kellogg-Hayes, Briggs, United Corp., Standard Brands, Budd Manufacturing, Northern Pacific, Santa Fe, New York Central, Lackawanna, Union Pacific, Southern Pacific, Western Union and Sears Roebuck.

Crown Cork and Schenley both ran up about 3 points.

BEND YOUTH PINNED AS LUMBER SHIFTS

Jury Finds Salem Policeman Guilty

SALEM, June 17. (AP)—A circuit court jury of seven men and five women required only 15 minutes of deliberation late Tuesday to find Sergeant Orey Coffey of the Salem police department guilty of accepting a bribe from a slot machine operator.

He will be sentenced Monday morning. The prescribed term is from one to five years in state prison.

The principal witness against Coffey was Elwood Brown, who testified he paid the officer \$10 a month for seven or eight months for permission to operate his slot machine in a cafe without arrest.
