CITY PAVEMENT WORK STARTED

Annual summer repair of city pavement started Thursday morning, with E. A. Thomas, city engineer, in charge.

The first project undertaken will be the construction of a storm sewer in the alley between Main and Pine streets between Seventh and Eighth streets. Thomas announced, and this will be followed by repair of pavement in this alley.

All bad places on city streets will be repaired, and roadways in Moore park, which have been badly damaged by heavy frosts and snows, will also be rebuilt.

Dunn and Baker company, which holds contract for surfacing seven miles of secondary state highway on the west side road, or Lakoshor drive, will repair the park pavements while their equipment is in that vicinity, Thomas stated.

149 BONUS LETTERS STILL UNDELIVERED

A total of 149 bonus bonds remained undelivered at the Klamath Falls postoffice Thursday noon, according to an announcement from H. L. Griffith, assistant postmaster.

CORN DOMINATES GRAIN MARKET

CHICAGO, June 18.—Displacing wheat leadership to some extent, corn came into greater prominence today, and December corn contracts outdid the previous high price record for the season.

Scarcity of moisture over most of the corn belt, together with excellent shipping demand, had a stimulating effect on corn values. In some cases, corn futures climbed more than 14 cents a bushel.

Corn closed firm, 1-11 above yesterday's finish, Sept. 60 3/4, Dec. 56 1/2; wheat yesterday, 1-1 off, July 87 1/4, Sept. 88 1/4; oats 1-1 advanced, and provisions varying from 5 cents decline to an equal gain.
