

## TULELAKE HOTEL TO BE ENLARGED

TULELAKE, June 18.—The foundation for the new addition to the hotel building is being laid this week which when completed will add floor space of 30 by 65 feet to the original unit.

The addition, two stories in height, will face the store space on the ground floor on B street, providing room for three tenants. One section is to be occupied by the Tulelake Mercantile company, of which H. Weschler is proprietor. The firm will also retain the section already used.

The second is expected to be occupied by the local telephone exchange of the Columbia Telephone company, and the third is as yet unrented.

The upper floor is to be divided into eight hotel rooms, each entirely modern with bath, and a larger lobby is to be included, with large windows facing over town. Steam will heat the rooms.

The building of stucco and plaster finish will cost approximately \$11,000, according to Barks who is assisting with the construction work. No definite time has been set for completion of the project.

## Judge Sentences Hit-Run Driver To Prison Term

Glenn R. Erickson, 28-year-old Klamath Falls taxi driver, was sentenced to three years and six months in the state penitentiary Wednesday for failure to stop at the scene of an accident.

It was Erickson who, a week ago, seriously injured Edgar James and Delbert Wahl by crashing into them with his car on Main street near the Baldwin hotel. He then backed out and fled from the scene of the accident.

Erickson waived preliminary hearing and grand jury indictment following his arrest, and pleaded guilty to the hit-and-run charge.

Investigation showed that Erickson has previously served terms in Minnesota and California penitentiaries for burglary and that he has a long record of arrests for reckless driving.

Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst, who imposed sentence, said there would be no parole in the case as far as he was concerned.

Dore told his visitors they represented the "scabs" and that he was for "organized" labor.

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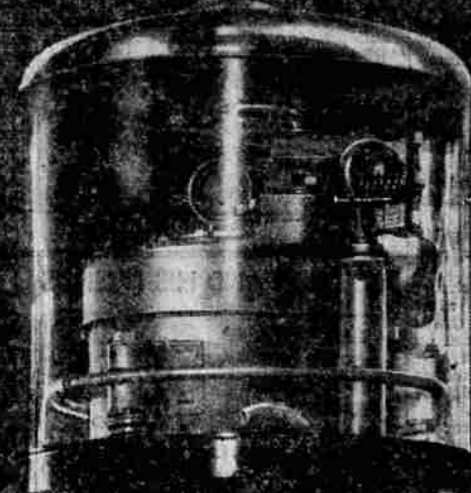
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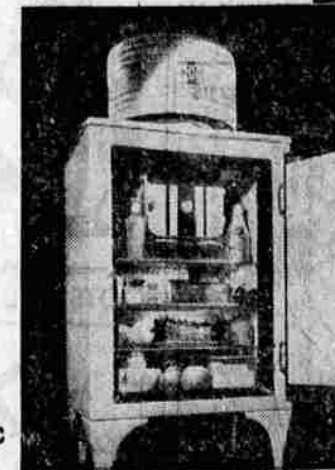
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
