FIDAE PROGRAM PRESENTED AT MEET

A special program was given at the meeting of the American Legion auxiliary Tuesday evening by Mrs. M. E. Cooper, presenting the work of Fidac, for securing the work of Fidac, for development of international friendship and understanding as a foundation for permanent peace.

"Fidac is the great, interlarded organization of World War veterans that is dedicated to the work of maintaining the friendships established when its members served side by side in the war and using these friendships in the cause of peace," explained Mrs. Cooper. "It is the largest organization in the world, with more than 8,000,000 members. Every member of the American Legion and the Legion auxiliary is a member of Fidac, and all work in support of Fidac."

"Each year the American Legion auxiliary studies one of the other countries associated in Fidac as part of its Fidac program, and this year Poland was selected, where the 1936 Fidac congress will be held in September."

After explaining what Fidac stands for, and its purpose, Mrs. Cooper gave an interesting story on Poland, giving a condensed history of the country, its customs, politics, educational system, government, resources and industries.

By studying different nations we gain an understanding of their peoples as a basis for international friendship. Real friendship among nations, we feel, must be the foundation of any lasting peace. Fidac, with its vast membership among eleven nations, maintains contacts that go deeper than diplomatic negotiations, that go into the hearts and homes of the people. By means of these, Fidac is working to establish understanding and good will between nations that will provide a firm foundation for the peace of the future," she declared.

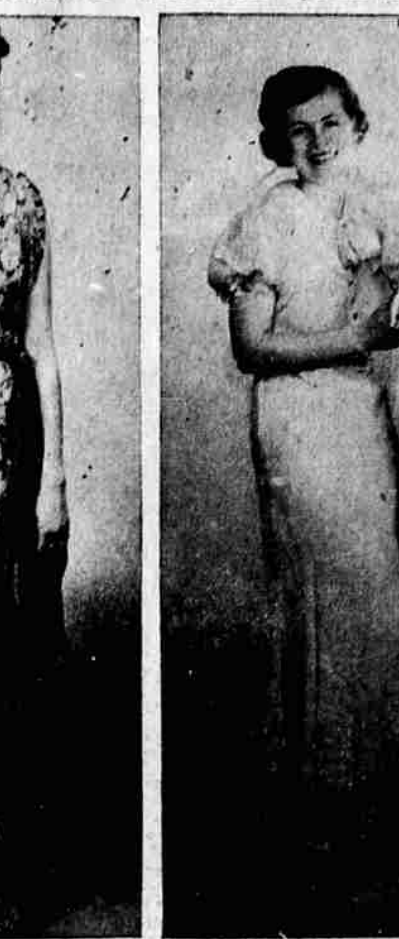
