TELEPHONE FIRM EXTENDING LINES

MERRILL, June 20.—An extension program is scheduled to get under way in the near future for the Columbia Utilities company, with installation of a new switchboard and cable for the office in Tulelake as the first project listed.

The office is to be moved from the present location in the Havlina building to rooms in the Clyde Barks building now under construction. The new quarters are expected to be ready in from 60 to 90 days and will include the office room and living quarters for the company's agent and chief operator, Mrs. Percy Jones. Vera Duncan is also a member of the office staff.

Tentative plans call for construction of approximately seven miles of telephone lines between Malin and Tulelake, which when completed, will give direct service between the two towns. The automatic switchboard at Malin will still be used.

Announcement of the improvement program was made this week by Dale Walker, south end manager, residing at Merrill.

LAKE REFLOODING PETITIONS ISSUED

MERRILL, June 20.—Petitions for permission to reflood Lower Klamath lake in an effort to abate the increased nuisance of clouds of dust that whip over the Merrill and Tulelake districts are being circulated over Klamath county and northern Elsie county under sponsorship of the Merrill Service club. The petitions were distributed at the last session of the club and are available for signing in Merrill, Malin, Klamath Falls and Tulelake.

Charles Mack, Klamath county assessor, addressed the group on the subject and is in possession of petitions at his office at the court house where residents may attach their signatures.

C. E. Cones, editor of the Tulelake Reporter, is also circulating a copy. Others may be found at the Laird drug store, at Dr. F. E. Trotman's office and at the office of Attorney Thomas W. Chaburn, all in Merrill.

The petitions call for flooding the original lake bed which will take in 40,000 acres on the California side of the line, leaving untouched the remainder of the 74,000 acres under the Lower Klamath Lake Grazing association. Twenty thousand acres of the total are privately owned, 7000 is privately leased government land, and the remainder is available for pasture.

It is the desire of the Service club to flood only such portions of the land as is burned out and useless for either farming or pasture, and according to those who have studied conditions on the Lower lake, the grazing lands will be benefited by the added moisture if reflooding is accomplished.

The club has gone on record as being opposed to any interference in the rights of the Lower Klamath Lake Grazing association, which at a recent meeting endorsed the plan for putting water over the suggested area. Goal of the dust committee is 10,000 names.

At the last session the club also went on record as being in favor of the cut off that will connect the Weed highway with The Dalles-California stretch, the turn to be made at Mac's corner on the latter highway and crossing country by way of Midland. The recommendation was made by the club road committee, Forrest C. Traville, T. W. Laird and George Offield.

Other guests at the luncheon session included Floyd Patty, representative of a Klamath Falls automobile company, and August Andrieu, Merrill, secretary of the Lower Klamath Lake Grazing association.
