"If you fail," they said, "then patriotic voters of all parties will know unhesitatingly to what standard they must rally in order to preserve the America of the great leaders of the past."

Allowance for opposition from the Smith sector had been made long since. After his December speech to the Liberty league, those "in the know" never expected him to support a new deal reelection. But this overnight summons from the right for a broad bolt against the new deal on grounds of fundamental Americanism, at the precise time when some left-third-party ticket of Rep. Lemke of North Dakota, brought up new factors. Did it mean Smith and that veteran stumpster, Reed, would support or campaign for Knox and Landon?

Was it possible to offset that appeal to a degree? Or should commitments on such subjects as farm aid and old age pensions be made explicit with the Lemke-

democratic convention opening tomorrow.

Roosevelt Dominates
It was quite apparent that the delegates had no intention of following Smith's advice. Roosevelt domination of the convention was conceded everywhere.

The party platform is being written at the White House, the administration proposal to change the party nominating rules is expected to triumph easily, and the way seems entirely clear for the renomination of Roosevelt and Garner before the weekend.

While the discussion widened, all but the final formalities were set for beginning the convention tomorrow.

Sub-committees heard factions from Minnesota argue about credentials, but both were for Roosevelt. Minor disputes about seats from the Canal zone and Puerto Rico also approached settlement.

Many Seconding Speeches
Senator Wagner of New York, presumably as a Roosevelt-approved platform draft in his pocket, was expected by late afternoon.

Forcing his way with handshakes through a hotel lobby overflowing with delegates and sightseers, the smiling Farley told a press conference of plans to have Governor Lehman, McNutt of Indiana, Graves of Alabama and others join the parade of 50 persons seconding the renomination of the president.

The cause for repeal of the two-thirds nominating rule picked up its support from the party veteran, Josephus Daniels, of North Carolina.

Farley reminded that this was "a democratic convention" and said the contest was "wide open."

Disenters Not Answered
Declining further comment on Smith, the chairman indicated there would be no official reply to the dissenters.

"There are plenty of substantial democrats in this country who will take care of it," he said, adding, "this convention will nominate a genuine democrat, Franklin D. Roosevelt."

Recalling Smith's affiliation with the American Liberty league, Farley said "the objectives and connections of people of this kind are by this time thoroughly well known to every American."

The tenor of remarks by several others prominent in the party was the same.

Invoking the memory of Jefferson, Jackson and Cleveland, the Smith statement issued in New York said that to be true to the democratic party meant taking "the heavy hand of government off business," balancing the budget and the ending of dole conditions.

Other signers were Former Senator James A. Reed of Missouri, Bainbridge Colby of New York, Former Governor Joseph B. Ely of Massachusetts, and Daniel F. Cohalan of New York.

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Coughlin-Townsend audience in view?
So ran the conjectures among groups clustered beneath portraits of Roosevelt and Garner in the corridors.

The Smith statement—and the reaction to it—vied with all other leading topics of discussion today.

Addressing themselves to the delegates, the Smith dissenters said "you must preserve the constitution, and under it the three separate, distinct and independent branches of government. To that end you must have a president who will remain within his own sphere of jurisdiction and not make the congress into a rubber stamp or try to intimidate the judiciary into an endorsement of his efforts to turn our republic into a dictatorship on the European model or an Asiatic absolutism."

"You must, above all, they said, 'put an end to the campaign now under full swing to buy the presidency with relief funds.'"

To abide by this advice, it was said, would "necessarily involve the putting aside of Franklin D. Roosevelt and the substitution of some genuine democrat—of whom you will have so many on your list of delegates."

Governor Graves and Senator Black of Alabama were among the first to speak out against the Smith statement.

"The next thing," said Black, "we will get advice from President House of the Liberty league, followed by the republican chairman. Logically the next will be Landon and Knox."

Senator O'Mahoney of Wyoming said Smith's mistakes dated back to the time when he failed to move to make the Roosevelt nomination unanimous at Chicago.

The delegates won't ever take a walk—or will the millions of voters," said Representative Hayburn of Texas.

WHEAT MAKES LATE RALLY AT CHICAGO

CHICAGO, June 22. (AP)—Wheat jumped late today to equal the high price record for the season, 95 cents September delivery, but then reacted on liberal profit-taking sales.

The late upturn accompanied trade reports that moisture northwest was neither heavy enough nor general enough to materially change domestic drought conditions. However, prices at Minneapolis were feeble compared with those in American markets.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1-1½ above Saturday's finish, July 95-95½, Sept. 95½; corn 2-1½ down, Sept. 64½; oats 1-½ off, and provisions unchanged to 10 cents decline.

Beavers Climb Into 3rd Place With Double Win

Surging upward on a winning streak which gained 12 victories in the last 14 starts, the Portland

Beavers stormed into third spot today, less than a half game from the Seattle Indians and San Francisco Missions.

The Beavers climaxed a rip-roaring week by trouncing the San Francisco Seals, 7-2 and 8-4 in a Sunday doubleheader to sweep the series with the loss of only one game.

Portland's rise from a poor fifth two weeks ago to within striking distance of the league lead, has been the result of fine pitching and deadly clouting by the supporting cast of players. In Sunday's games the Beavers pounded out 22 hits including a homer and three doubles by Holt, while Bill Poseidel and Tom Flynn restricted the Seals to 13 scattered blows. Ad Liska rescued Flynn in the second game when the Seals made their four runs in the seventh, but the Portland lead was too big to overcome. Saturday night George Caster blanked the Seals with four hits.

Seattle and the Missions remained in a first place tie when both suffered twin defeats in series finals. The Indians lost to the reawakened Los Angeles club 5-2, 5-1, and Sacramento's Senators, strengthened by new players, overcame the Missions 10-5, 3-0. San Diego completed the rout of Oakland, winning a doubleheader 20-4, and 3-2.

Seattle lost valuable ground against the Angels, who wound up the week in hostile ground with the odd-game margin in the series. Some 12,000 fans saw four errors give Dutch Leiber a victory over Lou Koupal in the first game, and witnessed the bombardment of Paul Gregory in the first two innings of the second contest for all the Los Angeles runs.
