

# LAKEVIEW-BURNS OIL JOB STARTS

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—The Lakeview-Burns highway has been oiled for a distance of 50 miles northward from Valley Falls. Oil has also been placed upon the Fremont highway from Valley Falls southward toward Lakeview a distance of five miles.

The oiling crew of the state highway department will continue to oil northward towards Burns until it reaches a point within six miles of the Central Oregon highway where it will skip a 10-mile stretch that is being oiled by a private contractor and will then close the 10-mile gap westward from Burns on the Central Oregon highway to the junction with the Lakeview-Burns highway.

Thus by August 1 the highway will be completely oiled between Lakeview and Burns with the exception of an eight-mile stretch along Crooked creek between Lakeview and Valley Falls which the bureau of public roads will soon commence to reconstruct and oil and which project will not be completed until late this summer.

# Inquiry Sought In Wierd Death Of Noblewoman

LOS ANGELES, June 22 (UP)—Reports of a love affair with a younger man and contents of two wills she left were checked Saturday as district attorney's investigators halted cremation and ordered an autopsy on the body of Baroness Rita Morrill, 44-year-old noblewoman who died under mysterious circumstances.

Three friends of the elderly leader of civic and club affairs were being questioned by order of District Attorney Byron Fitts, following a legal fight to prevent the body from being cremated. The baroness died Sunday night, presumably of heart disease, and before a fire department inhalator squad arrived.

The aged woman claimed to be a descendant of Marie Antoinette and formerly wore some of the famous Hapsburg jewels at lavish social functions she gave in Los Angeles.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, but official notice to the case came when several women friends of the baroness, apparently reading of the funeral, telephoned the district attorney's office asking for an investigation.

The region was adequately surveyed about 20 years ago by the United States geological survey and a power site and several sections of land were withdrawn from entry at that time.

It is believed that the present survey is being undertaken as a part of the water conservation program of eastern Oregon that is being sponsored by the federal government and state planning board.

# American Medical Association Head Passes at Seattle

SEATTLE, June 22. (UP)—Dr. J. Tate Mason, 54, president of the American Medical association, died Saturday afternoon at Virginia Mason hospital, which he founded, following an extended illness.

His death came a few weeks after the American Medical association in session at Kansas City, Mo., conferred upon him the highest award during a dramatic session.

He suffered from a thrombosis — blood clot—which necessitated amputation of one of his legs. He rallied sufficiently to hear radio broadcasts of the medical association's proceedings.

Several days after he was visited at his bedside by physicians, headed by Dr. Ralph Fennell, Portland, who formally installed him as president.

"I'll win this fight, Ralph," said Dr. Mason. But the amputation and the steady drain of his strength was too great.
