### West, East May Split Honors

Western Clubs Take Lead In National League While Eastern Dominates American Circuit.

Among them, the St. Louis Cardinals, Chicago Cubs and Pittsburgh Pirates should keep the National League end of the 1936 world series in the west.

With the Detroit Tigers hard hit by injuries and illness and the Cleveland Indians again a disappointment, an eastern array, either the New York Yankees or the Boston Gold Sox, appears destined to represent the American league.

The trouble with Mize in right field, however, is that he is a defensive menace there. The Pirates? Well, the bold crew is plenty surprising right now, and there's no telling when the current show horse will catch up with and pass the rest of the field.

### SEATTLE BOATS GAIN VICTORY

Washington's Triumphant Crews Now Point to Olympic Games.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., June 23. (AP)—In the wake of their smashing sweep of the inter-collegiate championship regatta on the Hudson river, two of the University of Washington's three triumphant eight-oared crews pointed today for the final American Olympic tryouts and the goal of a trip to Berlin to row for world honors.

To fortify their bid for the Olympic tests at Princeton, July 4 and 5, the all-conquering Huskies from Seattle plan to send their crack junior varsity eight, as well as the magnificent varsity boat load that came roaring through the last mile of the four-mile race last evening to dethrone California's defending champions and achieve the first three-pley sweep in 24 years.

New Challenge Faced

On Lake Carnegie and over the Olympic 3,000 meters route, equivalent to one mile and a quarter, Washington's oarsmen will be challenged again by five of the college crews they defeated Tuesday, as well as several of the east's crack club eights. But the fashion in which the Huskies disposed of their opposition on the Hudson clearly established either or both of Washington's entries as Olympic favorites.

Washington's "big boat," the first Husky varsity to come swinging home in front at Poughkeepsie since Al Ulbrickson, now the head coach, stroked the victorious 1925 crew, looked as though it was practicing for the Olympics in the varsity race.

Second Coast Sweep

In the words of a coach who was in position to view the proceedings with an unprejudiced eye—Charlie Whiteside, late of Harvard—Washington "rowed a superb 2,000 meters on top of a high paddle." He meant, in short, that the Huskies coasted for about two and three-quarters miles, rating themselves well off the pace, and then put on the pressure to win going away in the last mile and a quarter.

The coast crews thus completed their second straight sweep and routed all eastern rivals. The five crews from the west took three firsts and two seconds, which is par for the course.

Washington's sweep was the first since Cornell last monopolized the regatta program in 1912. That was when the junior varsity race was a four-oared event, however. The Huskies became the first outfit to sweep an all eight-oared regatta here, dating from 1914.

### Fishing News

Deschutes River Above Bend—Fly fishing has been good on the entire area—in most cases throughout the day. Doesn't seem to make an awful lot of difference what fly is used.

Deschutes River Below Bend—Some good catches have been made in the vicinity of Steel Head falls and also along the river below the mouth of Crooked river. The large fish are rising very satisfactorily to a bucktail caddis.

Crooked River—Still consistently good on bucktail caddis.

Lius River—Very fine fly fishing is had for a short period each day. The fish, however, refuse to follow any time that may be set for them so you will have to take your own chances.

North and South Twin Lakes—These two lakes have apparently been staging a comeback and some very fine fishing has been enjoyed there during the past week.

Elk Lake—Fair catches being made trolling but little interest has been shown in flies during the past week. A few warm days, however, will produce some very fine fly fishing.

East Lake—Still consistently good. Use fly, trout orno, wabber, spoon or bait.

Paulina Lake—Fishing has been very good and some fine large fish being taken. Some very large ones reported taken on fly.

Crescent Lake—Fishing has been very good whenever the sun came out and warmed things up during the past week. Large ones on troll and up to 17 inches on flies.

Odeil Lake—Very good fly fishing reported. In fact fly fishing has been so good that very little trolling has been done.

Diamond Lake—Limit catches being consistently made on red head plugs. Must have more warm weather to produce fly fishing.

Cultus Lake—The mud hole between Cascade lakes highway and Cultus lake has been fixed and the road is now in good condition. Fair fishing on troll if you have your own boat.

Suttle Lake—Fair catches of rainbow and bluebacks being made on spoon and worms.

### BOSTON BEES SHOW POWER

Club A Long Way Out of National League Cellar.

The sports "experts" who have been wrong so often this year that they're developing a special technique in laughing off embarrassing predictions, are beginning to worry about their almost unanimous pre-season forecast that the Boston Bees would finish in the National League cellar.

The Bees haven't threatened to leave the second division yet, but their recent performance against strong opposition have made last place look a long way off.

Following the lead of the Brooklyn Dodgers, who broke Chicago's 15-game winning streak Sunday, the Bees whipped the Cubs 5 to 1 Monday, to hang up their sixth victory in eight games. That loss applied the brakes more firmly to Chicago's rush toward the top, as the Cardinals outaged the Phillies, 8-6, increasing their lead to 11 games.

New York's Yankees likewise increased their lead, whipping the White Sox 9-6 while the champion Detroit Tigers edged out Boston's Red Sox 8-7 to regain fourth place in the American league standing.

The Washington Senators, who had been tied with the Tigers, were rained out at St. Louis while the Athletics to a 4-3 victory over the third-place Cleveland Indians.

### BRITT FACES REAL THREAT

Rough Ted Christy May Bring Second Loss to Champion.

A strong challenge from Ted Christy awaits Champion Alvin Britt at the Klamath armory tonight.

Once beaten in Klamath Falls, the junior heavyweight title holder of the National Wrestling association will be on edge for his second main event. Championships are not supposed to meet defeat in non-title matches, and Britt's reputation will be seriously damaged if he drops a bout to the California ruffian.

Christy, finalist in the Los Angeles tournament, should be just about as tough an opponent for Britt as Dude Chick, who dumped the champion at the armory last week. Powerful and rugged, Christy ordinarily needs but a few moments to put his opponent on the defensive before slapping him to the mat. The Californian, while no particular menace as a scientific grappler, is dangerous because of his roughness. A well-landed blow at any time during the match may mean defeat for the champion.

Britt is not unfamiliar with Christy's manner of wrestling. It was Christy who stood as the final barrier to Britt six weeks ago in Los Angeles. The champion, although pinned for one fall, stopped Christy to win the belt presented by George Raft, the actor.

Both men will come into the ring tonight over the junior heavyweight limit of 190 pounds. The title will not be risked.

While Britt and Christy hold the main event spotlight, they may be eclipsed by the semi-windup meeting of Pete Helanetro and Prince Mihalakis. Mihalakis won a sensational match last
