COAST AUTOMOBILE SALES INCREASE

SAN FRANCISCO, June 24. (AP)—A sensational gain in automobile sales in the Pacific northwest, more than doubling last year's volume in the state of Washington, lifted sales of the Pacific coast states 41 per cent in May this year over last.

Washington sales totaled 5,691 passenger cars, a gain of 103 per cent over the 2,754 units sold in May 1935. Although the Washington margin over last year was spectacular, it did not preclude a moderate seasonal recession from the 6,321 cars sold in April this year.

Oregon, on the other hand, with a gain of 84 per cent over last year, topped the April figures. Oregon passenger car sales were 4,296 units in May, compared with 2,255 in May 1935 and 4,133 in April 1936.

PORTLAND STRIKE COMES TO CLOSE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 24 (AP)—The strike of union automobile mechanics came to an end today—the second labor controversy to be terminated here in the past three days.

J. W. Reardon, business agent for the mechanics' union, said "We've called off the strike, at least for the present."

Loggers and employers in the western Columbia river area reached an agreement Monday. State Labor Commissioner Charles Gray, who is seeking a location for the proposed independent hiring hall, said he believes ratification by the saw-logs.

Several hundred union mechanics struck May 11 for a closed shop, a 40-hour week and a 90-cents-an-hour minimum.
