SPOKANE, Wash., June 25. (UP)—Clarence Anderson, 17, shot and killed his father, Leroy Anderson, 44, late Wednesday after a quarrel in the family home.

Young Anderson, held by police tonight on an open charge while authorities questioned him, confessed to the shooting, police said.

According to the boy's story his father had been drinking and abusing the family for several hours and today's killing culminated three years of trouble in the home.

GILMORE PARADE BIG 4TH FEATURE

Some time next week ghosts of the past—giant, inflated rubber "animals"—huge elephants, lions, and other vertebrates that roamed this land millions of years ago, will descend on Klamath Falls.

Two and three stories high during their "inflation" period, the "animals" will be an outstanding feature of the Gilmore circus parade to be staged July 4 as part of the Legion's celebration parade.

Arrangements for bringing the huge parade of giant animals here were made by Legion officers, who had heard of the tremendous interest animals of this type, designed by Tony Sarg, had aroused in New York when they paraded, and working with officials of the Gilmore circus negotiations were completed for bringing the huge parade here.

The parade will also include clowns, callopes, bands and 15 giant headed figures.

"Beyond a doubt, the Gilmore circus parade will be one of the most sensational and unusual events ever presented in Klamath Falls," stated Les Finley, parade chief. "Never before in the history of western festivals has anything been presented that approaches this circus parade in colorful originality."

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BOSTON WOOL
BOSTON, June 25. (AP)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Moderate quantities of a few grades of domestic wools were occasionally being sold in Boston. Some of the recent calls were on # blood combing wool. A little combing Ohio fleece wool of # blood graded was sold at 38-39 cents in the grease, which was equivalent to 70-74 cents scoured basis. Combing # blood territory wool brought 76-78 cents scoured basis on a number of transactions involving fair quantities.

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
