

JUDGES SELECTED FOR BIKE PARADE

The judges are Carl Cook, juvenile officer, Frank Jenkins, publisher, and Earl Reynolds, chamber of commerce.

The manager and the judges had still more to say about the parade. They wanted to stress the fact that it is originality which will count most in the selection of winners.

"The boy or girl, man or woman, who best expresses his or her individuality probably stands the best chance to win the first prize," said one of the judges.

The judges also wanted to express an interest in the recent revival of bicycling for all ages, feeling that it is a healthful and very enjoyable sport, which can be as pleasant in 1936 as it was in the 90's.

"It's a sport worth encouraging," they said, "and this parade will help to do that as well as provide a lot of fun and some prizes worth having."

The Klamath Falls parade will begin in front of the Montgomery Ward store at 2 p. m., and will be a part of a nation-wide parade staged this week in more than 500 towns. The judges will be on hand at 2 p. m. for the parade. All entrants must be registered. Prizes will be five dollars, three dollars, and two dollars in sporting goods merchandise at Ward's.
