Mabee Quits Post With Klamath

Assistant Will Become Head Coach at Aberdeen High School.

Klamath high school loses George Mabee, the assistant football coach.

Mabee, who worked successfully with Leslie Avrit, head coach in placing a strong football team in the field last autumn, has resigned to accept the coaching post at Aberdeen high school in Washington.

The announcement of his selection came through the Associated Press at Aberdeen Friday.

An able athletic leader, Mabee was a varsity football player at the University of Wyoming. He played end.

Coming to Oregon State college to continue his studies, he served as an assistant coach under Paul Schissler, former Beaver head man. Later he was instructor in physical education at the University of Oregon.

His chief jobs at Aberdeen will be in football and basketball. He will also teach social science and English.

Mabee is credited with giving the Pelicans the strong line defense almost sufficient to defeat the Medford Tigers, leading rival of the Klamath teams, on Modoc field last autumn.

Through the unique delayed charge by which the line was pulled back, the Medford ball-carriers had little luck against Klamath last year. The Tigers won the contest on a disputed touchdown.

Always interested in boxing and wrestling, Mabee started the high school's most successful smoker last spring.

The coach has left Klamath Falls for the summer, and will move to Aberdeen in August.

Avrit will be back in the fall to start his sixth season as head coach.

Sherman Ellsworth and Harry Givan, both from Seattle, opened the semi-final with Givan favored. Fifteen minutes later Forest Watson, third sound city golfer surviving yesterday's two 18-hole rounds, matched strokes with Jim Robertson, British Columbia's hope for the title left open by the first round defeat of Scotty Campbell of Seattle.

Diamond Lake: The Diamond lake highway, from The Dalles-Columbia highway south of Chemult, is in excellent condition. Fishing reports from Diamond lake for this past week have been just fair.

Crescent Lake: The road into Crescent lake is in good condition. A few good catches of trout are being brought in from there. Trolling with a double bladed spinner, sometimes with worms or eggs for bait, produces best results.

Odell Lake: The Willamette highway into Odell lake is in good shape. This road is now open through to McCredie Springs and Oakridge but it is necessary to use a forest road from a short distance beyond Odell lake to McCredie Springs, which we understand is not at all advisable.

On all reports, fishing at Odell lake is very good. Many nice catches are being made by trolling with double bladed spinners, sometimes using bait. Fly fishing is oftentimes good in the evenings.

Crater Lake National Park: The Klamath and Medford entrances to the park are oiled highways and in good condition to the rim of the lake. The east or Sand creek entrance is open and in fair shape. They hope to have the rim road, or north entrance, open by July 1. Accommodations are available at the lodge and housekeeping cabins can be secured. The dining room in the lodge and the cafeteria are both open. Beginning next week, July 1, the new Crater lake buses will make regular trips to the lake and back, leaving Klamath Falls at 8:00 a. m. and arriving at Crater lake at 10:00 a. m. On the return trip, the bus leaves the lake at 5:00 p. m. and arrives in Klamath Falls at 6:30 p. m. The first of July will see the season in full swing at Crater lake and all concessions open for business.

The North and South Forks of Sprague river continue to be good for fly fishing, the North Fork being a little better. Blue Uprights are being used for lure. Dairy creek is good for fly fishing. The Bly-Paisley road into that district is in

fairly good shape and cars have been going in from Paisley. All of the small mountain streams in the Rocky Point and Lake o' the Woods vicinity are reported fair fishing with worms for bait. Good catches of bass are being made at Amber Reservoir on tandem spinners.
