

MALIN CHOOSES RODEO SLOGAN

MALIN, June 26.—"The Wild Little Town in the West" has been chosen by Malin as a slogan for the second annual rodeo to be sponsored by the Malin post, American Legion, July 4-5.

The grandstand used last year on the old rodeo grounds east of town was moved to the new track Tuesday, and additions have been made that will bring the seating capacity to 1500.

Legion members are assisting this week with completion of necessary details, adding the final touches to building the chutes and corrals and whipping the track into shape for the race events.

The following list of prizes to be offered for the various entries was made public this week by "Slim" Christian, rodeo manager:

Bronco riding, purse \$200: first money \$100, second \$60, third \$40, entrance fee to be added.

Calf roping contest: first \$50, second \$25, entrance fee added.

Bull riding with saddles, daily prizes: first \$15, second \$10.

Relay race, daily prize money: first \$35, second \$15.

Cow pony race, entrance fee added: first \$15, second \$10.

Steer riding, daily prize money, entrance fee added: first \$15, second \$10.

Hackback horse riding, daily money, entrance fee added: first \$20, second \$10.

Musical chair race, one prize, \$5.

Wild horse race, daily: first prize \$20, second \$10.

Stake race, daily: \$10.

Human and chariot races will also be included in the program daily.

PLANS FOR SCHOOL ADDITION ORDERED

TULELAKE, June 26.—Plans and specifications for the proposed addition to the high school building, which will include three classrooms and a library, have been ordered prepared by Stark and Flanders, Sacramento, according to George Reiben, principal of the high school.

Estimated cost of the building, which will be frame to conform with the present structure, is \$12,000. The addition will be financed from the budget of the Siskiyou Union high school district.

The new classrooms will provide space for the steadily increasing enrollment, and the teaching staff will be increased with the addition of an agricultural instructor.

A glass partition, which will separate the typing classes from others taking commercial work, has been installed and painted. Work on the building is expected to be completed early in the fall.

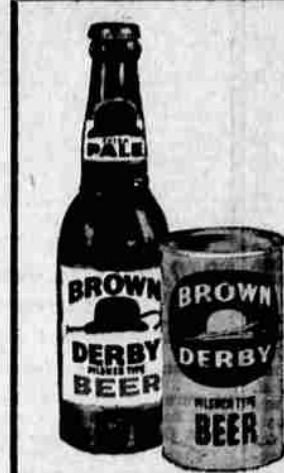
