

OREGON GROUP LAUDS POLICY OF DEMOCRATS

PHILADELPHIA, June 27. (AP)—Chairman William A. Delzell of the Oregon delegation to the democratic convention today described the party platform as "highly acceptable" to his state.

He said he was speaking for Oregon's 10 delegates.

Howard Latourrette of Portland, newly-seated democratic national committeeman for Oregon, said he subscribed "wholeheartedly to the views expressed by Delzell."

The agricultural plank made the deepest impression on the Oregon group, Delzell asserted.

"It will sound good to far western farmers," he said. "The farmers out there know that the new deal saved them, even if Senator Frederick Steiwer of Portland didn't."

The platform in general "bids fair for a clean sweep for Oregon democratic nominees in the 1936 general election," Delzell said.

"The convention attracted 'unprecedented crowds' with delegates, visitors and residents of Philadelphia 'showing unbounded enthusiasm for the new deal' in this stronghold of old guard republicans," Delzell said.

"It is plainly apparent President Roosevelt has the old guard on the run and the same enthusiasm will carry the far west for the democrats," he added.

The "enthusiasm of the delegates will be carried home" and in July at a meeting of the new state democratic committee in Portland a "vigorous and energetic state campaign for the new deal will be launched," Latourrette said.

Instructed for the Roosevelt-Garner ticket the Oregon delegation joined in the renomination of Roosevelt at last night's session by parading up and down the aisles, carrying the Oregon state flag and banners and cheering.

Delzell said the Oregon delegation also endorsed the address delivered last night before the convention by Mrs. Nan Wood Honeyman of Portland, democratic nominee for representative in congress for the third Oregon district and selected to make one of the many speeches seconding the renomination of Roosevelt.

GOLD RECOVERED BY CYANIDE PLANT

HAYDEN HILL, Cal. — The Hayden Hill Gold Corporation is making a 96 per cent recovery of gold with a modern cyanide plant that was put into operation last October and is handling an average of 25 tons of ore per day of 24 hours, according to F. H. Brown, superintendent.

The corporation, a subsidiary of the William J. Stratton company of Spokane, which has been extending its activities on Hayden Hill for the last three years, now controls the Blue Bell, Juniper, Golden Eagle, North Star and the Grey Goose group. All were producers in the old days but have since had long periods of idleness.

The cyanide plant is running partly on material from the old mine dumps, estimated to aggregate more than 100,000 tons, and partly on ore from underground developments made by the Stratton interests, including a 1200 foot tunnel under the Golden Eagle that is being worked at present. It is estimated that the old dumps alone will yield gold enough to pay for the mill, and there is enough ore in sight underground for several years' operation.

Ore entering the plant passes through a crusher and is then reduced in solution to a minus 60 mesh by a Straub ball mill in closed circuit with a Dorr classifier. The flow sheet is from the classifier to the primary thickener, through three Dorr agitators and four Dorr thickeners, the latter made necessary by the colloidal nature of the ore.

The cyanide treatment used in extracting the gold from the pulverized ore is described by Brown as a continuous undercurrent decantation method. The treatment progresses through a series of seven huge tanks in which every ore particle is subjected to prolonged action of cyanide solution. Precipitation is effected by the Merrill-Crow simultaneous precipitation-clarification process.

The plant is equipped with a modern and complete assay laboratory. Fifteen men are employed at present. The corporation is slated to contemplate immediate enlargement to 100 tons capacity by the addition of a leaching plant. Installation of a Diesel-driven air compressor is also planned for this summer.

Hayden Hill is 20 miles southeast of Bieber.

PORT ANGELES, Wash., June 27. (UP)—Tourists left \$25,000,000 in Oregon during the year 1935, said Harold S. Say, head of the travel and information department of the Oregon state highway commission, speaking before the second session of the Washington state association of county commissioners and highway engineers in their three-day conventions here.

Say outlined the commission's expenditure of \$50,000 in 1935 to bring tourists to the north-west region and specifically to "drive Oregon highways."

Say said the commission estimated tourists had left \$750,000 in gasoline taxes in Oregon last year, the chief source of advertising and development funds. He pointed out that the Oregon state highway commission worked closely with the Washington Evergreen Playground association in advertising and promotion.

The Evergreen association is planning to spend about \$35,000 in advertising for western Oregon, western Washington and British Columbia.

SEATTLE, June 27. (UP)—The Rev. Bernard R. Hubbard, famed glacier priest of Santa Clara university, Santa Clara, Calif., said Friday that hereafter he would give Seattle a wide berth on his trips to Alaska and sail from Vancouver, B. C., instead, due to vigorous protests by residents here against the barking of his husky dogs.

Three of the dogs were kept in a lot adjoining Seattle college and neighbors complained to the police that the barking disturbed them. The keeper said he slept with the dogs all night to keep them quiet and that they barked only once when some other dogs came near them.

"This is the second time Se-

attle has made a fuss about my dogs and I'm going to ship out of Vancouver next year," Father Hubbard said heatedly. "My dogs wouldn't bark if people would keep their cliff-faced little lap dogs at home."

The keeper said the huskies had become infuriated when they saw the other dogs' freedom and made known their ire with loud barking.
