GRAND JURY
MAKES REPORT
LATE FRIDAY

Little promise of fireworks was contained in the first report of the new Klamath county grand jury, presented to the circuit court late Friday afternoon. The jury returned nine open indictments against four men, six secret indictments and three not true bills, reported the county poor farm in good condition and recommended a general clean-up at the county jail.

John J. Nolan and Jack Funsion were named in an indictment charging larceny in a store. They were alleged to have stolen seven pairs of men's trousers from the Oregon Woolen store at Eighth and Main streets, June 5.

Named Seven Times
Seven separate indictments were returned against Ben Benjamin. Benjamin was charged with having passed a series of \$5 and \$10 bad checks at hotels, drug stores and clothing stores of Klamath Falls, June 20 and 21, paying a small amount for merchandise or lodging and taking the rest in change.

Bert Mamprin was indicted on a charge of failing to support his two minor children.

Not true bills were returned in the cases of Eugene O'Shea, assault armed with a dangerous weapon; Noble M. Streeter, larceny, and O. C. Shaw and George Young, larceny.

It was understood the secret indictments all pertained to minor cases.

Want New Mattresses

The thorough cleaning of the jail asked by the grand jury specifically mentioned the cells, windows, ventilator screens, bed bugs and vermin. The jury also urged purchase of 12 new mattresses, repair of the concrete floor in the bull pen and painting of the upstairs of the jail. The poor farm was declared in good order, and no changes were suggested.

The report was signed by H. N. Moe, grand jury foreman.

News of Oregon

PORTLAND, June 27, (AP)—Oregon's annual crime bill is \$25,000,000—more than half the cost of Bonanza dam—W. L. Goslin, secretary to Governor Charles Martin, told the Portland Realty board. He advocated a "reformatory system of treatment" with greater use of the parole.

ASTORIA, June 27, (AP)—Mrs. William Bartlett, Seaside, 15-year-old bride of two weeks, owed her life today to the vigilance of two lifeguards, Wally Hug and John Thompson. They brought her safely to shore after she was swept beyond her depth while wading in the surf.

PORTLAND, June 27, (AP)—Engineers awaited word from Washington today concerning allocation of funds before proceeding with plans for Oregon's flood-control program.

Lieutenant Colonel Milo C. Fox said congressional authorization for an expenditure of \$10,000,000 for the Columbia river and its tributaries did not carry with it an actual allotment, but that it was hoped a portion of the \$125,250,000 emergency relief bill funds would be released pending allocation under the other program.

PORTLAND, June 27, (AP)—Deputies of the Oregon National Guard today brought injuries to the motorcade and two passengers and the arrest of O. F. Brown, Yakima, Wash., truck driver, on a charge of reckless driving.

PORTLAND, June 27, (AP)—Oregon's pro-America, an organization of republican women, launched its drive for the November elections today after a state meeting here, at which National Republican Committeeman Ralph E. Williams said "the convention couldn't have nominated finer candidates."

Williams said, "We will sweep the country in November for London and Knox. I have never attended a convention with so many sour notes before it and such complete harmony at its close."

Fourteen Oregon counties were represented at the meetings. Mrs. George T. Gerlinger, Portland, state president, said 35 counties were organized and reports given indicated groups in five others are being formed.

ASTORIA, June 27, (AP)—Oregon's national guardsmen, bronzed by a coastal sun, and equipped and uniforms in perfect order, will take the field at 2:30 p. m. today in the annual review marking the end of the summer training camp.

Thirty-three hundred men will parade past a reviewing stand, where their superior officers and Governor Martin and Major General Albert H. Blanding of Washington, will be seated, surrounded by thousands of visitors who began arriving here yesterday for

EUGENE, June 27, (AP)—Assurance that land grant timber will be made available for purchase cheered Willamette Valley lumbermen today.

A wire from Senator Charles McNary (R., Ore.) said Secretary of the Interior Ickes had promised to rescind his recent order barring sales.

H. J. Cox, secretary of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association, said more than 300 mills were jeopardized by the no-sale order.

PORTLAND, June 27, (AP)—Market sources said today that a boom reminiscent of better days was appearing in the Pacific coast hop trade because of a shorter crop than estimated.

From a price of 8c to 10c per pound, Oregon hops in a week leaped to 17c.

Downy mildew was blamed for the prospective shortage, which may give Oregon a crop of not more than 50,000 to 60,000 bales, compared to 114,000 last year.

N. Y. GOVERNOR
GETS OVAATION

PHILADELPHIA, June 27, (AP)—A thundering ovation at the democratic convention put squarely up to Governor Herbert H. Lehman today the question of whether he would run again next fall and help President Roosevelt carry New York.

As if set off by a spring, hundreds of delegates bounded into the aisles shortly before midnight as Lehman arose to second the nomination of President Roosevelt. A parade started around the convention hall, bands blared and a solid wall of placards, mounted on poles, were lifted into the air proclaiming: "Lehman must run," "Lehman never failed," "a great governor," and "Lehman by a million."

The ovation was set off by the New York young democratic club which had arranged it to persuade Lehman to reverse his decision not to seek re-election this fall.

Re-election of Roosevelt was declared by Lehman to be essential to completion of the "social betterment" program undertaken by the new deal. A republican victory, he declared, would mean scrapping of much that has been set up.

Turning momentarily to a problem in his home state, Lehman said he had never been "more deeply disappointed or grieved than when the New York minimum wage act was declared unconstitutional by the supreme court by a divided vote of five to four."

Unless a reversal is granted on the appeal for rehearing, he said, "it is my firm belief and earnest hope that, through orderly constitutional amendment,
