Consider, for instance, the handsome results of long conferences between bag and shoe designers. Those days when you bought natural linen shoes then spent half of July looking for some kind of bag that would go with your dresses and with the shoes are gone forever.

This summer, the shoe salesman will show you several purses of natural linen, trimmed with bright patent to match the heels of the shoes. CANDIDATE RAPS OREGON'S C.O.P.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27. (AP)—The action of the Oregon delegation at Cleveland in refusing to place in nomination the only man whose name appeared on the Oregon republican ballot for vice president brought a letter of criticism from William S. Bennett, of New York, today. The attorney, who received 77,000 votes in this state in his quest of the nomination, wrote the Morning Oregonian that "timorous men afraid to keep a promise for fear someone would say 'boo' are not representative of the manhood of Oregon." The Oregon delegation, bound only to use its "best efforts" to obtain the nomination of the Oregon preferential primary choice, failed to nominate Bennett when it became apparent that Colonel Knox would be assured of the post. Bennett said, "I make no complaint of the fact that when Oregon was reached on the roll call the delegation voted for Colonel Knox. It was evident that Colonel Knox would be nominated and I would have been merely a gesture to have voted for me." He said his conversation with State Senator Joe Dunne of Oregon, when the latter asked Bennett to release the delegation, was "necessarily unpleasant" but that Dunne showed no "disrespect."

Court Hears Of Slovenly Habits Of Solon's Wife

SPOKANE, June 27. (AP)—The housekeeping and clothing habits of Mrs. Rosalie Jones Dill, wealthy New York women's rights leader, Friday underwent scrutiny as former Sen. Clarence C. Dill launched a parade of witnesses in his suit for divorce. Chief witness today was Mrs. Margaret Lorenz, former maid in the Dill's palatial Spokane home. "It took me a month to get the house cleaned up when I first came," testified Mrs. Lorenz. "The dirtiest place of all was Mrs. Dill's bedroom and bathroom. There were five or six rings around the tub. There were dirty towels on the floor. Some of them I burned. The bed sheets and pillows were filthy."

Questioned as to alleged slanderous statements made by Mrs. Dill concerning the former senator, she testified she heard Mrs. Dill had told her Dill was drinking heavily, was losing his mind, was blind and was going crazy. She also testified she heard Mrs. Dill telling someone over the telephone, "He is crazy and is losing his mind."

Judge W. A. Hunkeler had to whistle from the audience of 200 greeted testimony by a friend of Mrs. Lorenz that Mrs. Dill habitually wore "a dirty rag tied gavel for order when she presided at court." She had been told was a dirty wig. The remark was eliminated as hearsay. In contrast to the testimony, Mrs. Dill appeared in court wearing a smart summer frock—her second complete change in her "divorce wardrobe" for which she was shopping early this week.

Tanker in Distress Off Coast of Korea

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27. (UP)—The S. S. Magnolia, 6000-ton tanker of the General Petroleum company, was in serious distress and asked immediate aid near Ross island, off the coast of Korea, the marine department of the San Francisco chamber of commerce reported Friday. The Radio Corporation of America reported the Japanese motorship Awa Maru had been ordered to stand by and offer assistance to the ship, whose cargo of gasoline was leaking from large tanks in the holds. The Magnolia was bound from San Diego, Cal., to Dairen.
