Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, June 27, (AP)—Steele steadied in today's stock market, while American Telephone and a number of other leaders continued to droop.

Many traders were absent from the board rooms on extended week end holidays, and the two-hour turnover amounted to approximately 350,000 shares. The close was irregular.

Business news was still on the constructive side. The pleasing flow of favorable dividends and earnings displayed few signs of abating.

The financial sector took another look at the foreign situation as the French franc moved up sharply in terms of the dollar to its best level since last March.

The recent slide of American Telephone was said to have selected yesterday's public service commission order for a sharp reduction of rates by the company's principal New York subsidiary.

While the lower charges are supposed to go into effect August 1, it was thought the reduction might be held up if the company decides to take the matter to the courts.

The stock came back somewhat in the final few minutes of dealing.
