CHICAGO, June 29. (AP)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Hogs 17,000; unevenly 5-15c higher than Friday's average; top \$19.85; bulk desirable 160-250 lbs., \$10.60-80; 250-325 lbs. mostly \$10.35-75; better grade 140-160 lbs., \$10.35-75; bulk hogs, \$8.75-9.50; few \$9.75 and better.
Cattle 15,000; calves 2,000; strictly grain fed steers and yearlings strong to 25c higher; common and medium grades steady; outsiders buying cattle at \$8.25 upward; top medium weight

steers \$9.50; yearlings \$9.25; good and choice fed heifers sharing steer advance; grassy heifers and all grass cows barely steady; bulls strong; vealers steady; practical top weights sausage bulls, \$5.75; vealers, \$8.50-9.50; select to \$10.00.
Sheep 8,000; opening slow, most bids on fat native lambs 25-50c lower at around \$11.00 with closely sorted kinds at \$11.25; throwouts draggy, around \$8.00; fat ewes fully steady; bulk handyweights, \$3.00-4.00.

LOCAL EAGLES TAKE HONORS AT CONCLAVE

Members of the Klamath Falls Eagles auxiliary have returned from the state convention at Silverton, after winning many honors at the two-day session. Verma Gay was elected to the office of state conductress, Stella Perrell as state musician, and Betty Wood as state flag bearer. The local organization also won the class B ritualistic trophy which was offered by the Klamath Falls auxiliary and sponsored by E. Z. Bender. They also took a class B cup given by the state provisional auxiliary, and a cup given by D. D. Hall, state organizer of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, for the first and only Women Eagles drum corps in the state.

This drum corps appeared in the big parade which was a feature of the convention, and also at several street concerts. Special credit was given to Joe Soldenberger, drum instructor, and to Officer Carl Cook, drill instructor, who drilled the corps before the convention. The 1937 convention will be held at Astoria, Ore.

CRATER LAKE STAMP NO LONGER SOLD

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., June 29 (Special).—Of interest to stamp collectors is the announcement that the six-cent Crater Lake National Park stamp has been removed from sale, marking the first break in the national park stamp series. The six cent stamp was first placed on sale at Crater Lake September 5, 1924, and has since then been continuously available. It has been popular due to the fact that it was available for use in mailing a letter slightly over the normal three cent weight and also for air mail.

Collectors of the romantic trend impressed by the appeal of the Indian legendry associated with the view of Crater lake depicted, contributed materially to the fact that this stamp was the first of the series to be exhausted. The legend involving the death struggle of Llano, the evil spirit of the underworld, and Skell, the God of the upper world, is regarded by collectors as the most fantastic bit of Indian lore portrayed in the entire series.

Figures reveal that originally 15 million of the perforated six cent stamps were printed. Over 50,000 were used as first day covers and about 30 per cent were regarded as unsuitable for philatelic use, crediting the Crater Lake stamp with a prominent place by collectors among the worthy stamps of recent years.

Philatelic agencies report that its removal from sale has the immediate effect of raising its own market value as well as that of the entire series, of which several others are to be removed from sale within a short time. Further enhancing the Crater lake stamp is the fact that ordinarily all six cent stamps are orange but due to its design, it was printed in blue, making it one of the very few, perhaps the only one, so printed.

NORTH ENTRANCE HIGHWAY OPENED

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., June 29 (Special).—The north entrance highway to Crater lake is open to traffic and the rim road around the lake will be ready for traffic in a few days, Park Superintendent David H. Canfield announced today.

Snow plows have been engaged in opening the two routes for the past month, cutting through drifts ranging from 10 to 25 feet in depth, the result of winter long snow accumulation. The opening of the north entrance makes traffic possible to Diamond lake, 19 miles away, and to The Dalles-California highway via the Beaver Marsh road, an important travel route for park visitors arriving from Bend.

Daily motor caravans around the lake will begin in early July, leaving the Sinnott Memorial Orientation station in the rim area at 8:15 a. m., returning by noon, accompanied by a ranger-naturalist. Stops are made at a number of observation points where ranger-naturalists offer explanations of geologic phenomena, direct the attention of visitors to vistas of scenic beauty and answer questions.

The Crater Wall trail from the rim to the shore of Crater lake is now open to visitors. CCC labor opened the 1 1/2 mile route from the rim to the shore, shoveling through deep drifts to make it accessible to foot travel. With the trail open, launch excursions will be offered July 1, taking visitors to points of interest accompanied by ranger-naturalists who explain the different scenes viewed, such as Wizard Island, Phantom Ship and the crater walls in general.

boat landing for fishing purposes. No angling license is required and the limit per day per person has been set at 12 gamey rainbow or steelhead trout, with which the lake has been heavily stocked.

Pete Johnson, Ed Wilson, Sven Johnson, Benjamin Briggs and Amos Picard, \$10 each or five days in jail for drunkenness.

Several alleged habitual offenders were assessed heavier fines and jail sentences on intoxication charges. These included: John Roach, Perry John, Dan McDonald and Miles Wukaw, \$20 each, or 10 days in jail, and Horace Choektoot, \$15 or 7 1/2 days.

Hearings for Sam Ward and Don Smith who pleaded not guilty to charges filed against them were set for 4:30 o'clock Monday afternoon in police court. Ward was charged with

disorderly conduct, and Smith with vagrancy.
