COUNTY COURT ENCOURAGED BY HIGHWAY GROUP

Members of the county court declared Monday that they were encouraged by their reception at the week-end state highway commission in Portland, at which they presented suggestions for changes in the secondary highway program in Klamath county.

They said members of the commission appeared favorable to the court's ideas, and that Chief Engineer R. H. Baldock will come to Klamath Falls shortly to look over the roads before final action is taken.

Changes which the court favors:

1. Take Weed-Klamath highway into primary system and out of secondary system.
2. Retain the South Sixth street-Midland road in the secondary system.
3. Put into secondary system east-west road from Mack's store to Midland.
4. Take Keno-Worden road into secondary system.

Baldock is expected to come here in July.

Negro Arrested After Shooting
