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democratic national convention and an audience of thousands drawn from the farms and cities of the mid-Atlantic states.

"I join with you. I am enlisted for the duration of the war."

Garner Accepts

Vice President John Nance Garner preceded Mr. Roosevelt to the platform to accept the nomination that was voted him today. President and vice-president were re-nominated in the wind-up sessions of the democratic national convention which adjourned at 2:30 p. m., since the having re-elected party's principles and merged the political organization founded by Thomas Jefferson with the Roosevelt new deal.

Garner, accepting the vice presidential nomination, said "I gladly accept the nomination for the vice presidency now tendered to me for the second time."

Mr. Roosevelt likened the economic royalists of today to the political royalists against whom colonial patriots in 1776 led an infant nation.

Hammering at special privileges and defending "the common man," the president said economic royalty complained that the new deal sought to overthrow the institutions of America.

The president accepted and endorsed the party platform which was adopted here this week without a dissenting vote. Then he pitched the campaign on a triple note of new deal objectives:

1. Protection of family and home.
2. Establishment of a democracy of opportunity.
3. Aid for the man, woman or child overtaken by disaster.

Mr. Roosevelt cast the American people in the role of saviors of world democracy. In other lands, he said, some weary people had "sold their heritage of freedom for the illusion of living."

Rendezvous With Destiny

"They have yielded their democracy," he continued. "I believe in my heart that only our success can stir their ancient hope. They begin to know that here in America we are waging a great war."

"To some generations much is given. Of others much is expected."

"This generation of Americans has a rendezvous with destiny," drawing heavily on what became a new deal parallel between the revolutionary torques and the opponents of the Roosevelt administration, the president said political tyranny, destroyed in this city on July 4, 1776, had been succeeded by a despotism of economic royalists.

"Privileged princes of these new economic dynasties," Mr. Roosevelt called the forces of wealth and big business aligned against him.

Industrial Dictatorship

"They created a new despotism," he said, "and wrapped it in the robes of legal sanction. In its service new mercenaries sought to regiment the people, their labor and their properties. And as a result the average man once more confronts the problem that faced the minute man."

Gone from control of the people, Mr. Roosevelt asserted, was power to order their own lives and the conditions of their labor. All that was "imposed by this new industrial dictatorship."

"The savings of the average family," he continued, "the capital of the small business man, the investments set aside for old age—other people's money—these were tools which the new economic royalty used to dig itself in."

Trust Probe Recalled

"Other people's money," had a familiar ring. It is the title of the book written in 1913 by

WORLD'S GREATEST HOUSEKEEPER SERVES RAILROAD TRAVELERS

Chicago, Ill.—The Pullman Company, operators of sleeping cars on the railroads of America, on the average annually "sleep" one-fifth of the population of the United States, it was revealed today in a letter received by Harry G. Taylor, Chairman of the Western Association of Railway Executives.

And with this huge overnight sleeping population to care for, the company has become one of the greatest housekeepers in the world—keeping a linen stock on hand totaling close to 9 million pieces. The company stocks nearly four

million towels, over two million sheets, one and three-quarter million pillow slips, five hundred thousand blankets, a similar number of pillows, a quarter million mattresses—and the porter who tends these things has over one hundred fifty thousand white jackets on hand for his own dress.
