Tru Delap was a lieutenant in the field artillery, First Division, and Perry Delap was a sergeant in the Quartermaster department. Both were overseas. Virgil Delap was with the Marines, stationed at San Pedro, Calif.



Mrs. Capitola Thompson, whose one son, Clyde Thompson, enlisted in the early part of the World War at Alturas, Calif., and went overseas with the Forty-first division. He served until the Armistice was signed.



Mrs. C. C. Low, whose son Lloyd L. Low, now sheriff of Klamath county, enlisted at Fort McDowell, Calif., in December, 1917. He went overseas in early May, 1917, and saw much service with the Third Army corps in the Oise-Aisne offensive and the Meuse-Argonne drive. Law was with the army of occupation in Germany for 10 months after the signing of the armistice.

One of the new and most delightful features of the show will be the sale of boutonnieres of summer flowers by a group of young girls with Miss Margaret Anne Waters as chairman. These boutonnieres will be sold from an attractively decorated booth and the proceeds will be used to defray expenses of the show.
