DORRIS, Calif., May 30.—At least two persons were severely injured Thursday night when a car driven by Floyd McLaughlin of Tennant, crashed into another machine, the driver of which was unidentified, nine miles south of here.

The known injured are Herbert Wynant and Christine Kuhl, passengers in McLaughlin's car. Wynant's hip was badly bruised and Miss Kuhl sustained a head cut.

It was believed one of the occupants of the second car had his shoulder cut. McLaughlin suffered only bruises and shock.

The two cars crashed together as they tried to pass on the highway. McLaughlin's machine was completely ruined.

The second automobile was occupied by three men, all of Tennant.
