There were a swift succession of events after Zioncheck's return to the capital last night from a trip to Pittsburgh.

As Mrs. Young sobbed at the hospital that she would "never stop my fight until I put that man in jail," Zioncheck breakfasted with friends.

The congressman had been in his apartment about 15 minutes when trouble began to brew between the Zionchecks on the one hand and Mrs. Young on the other. Mrs. Zioncheck became enraged over the presence of Mrs. Young, who recently complained vehemently that her antique furniture had been damaged.

"Get out of here," screamed Mrs. Zioncheck as she rushed from her bedroom to a living room couch on which Mrs. Young had stationed herself determined to remain in the apartment as long as the congressman and his bride.

"Help," cried Mrs. Young. Women Wall

Amid the wailing of the two women, the Washington state congressman emerged from the bedroom and shouted encouragement to his wife.

After a three-minute scuffle, Mrs. Zioncheck, with her husband's help, dragged Mrs. Young into the hallway, pitching her shoes out behind her.

A crowd gathered and excitement ran high. So high, in fact, that an unknown bystander lost his head, drew a penknife and stabbed a newspaper man in the arm. The newspaper man was only slightly injured.

Arriving a few minutes later, police were told by Mrs. Zioncheck that she became angry over Mrs. Young's insistence on remaining in the apartment. As the police tried to straighten things, Mrs. Young went back into the apartment and sulkily took up her post on the couch.

Finally, the police left, saying the controversy was a "civil matter."

The score of neighbors who had gathered in the hallway of the fashionable apartment house began to disperse, but about this time action broke out anew.

This time it was Zioncheck who rushed from the bedroom to pick up Mrs. Young and dump her out of the apartment.

As she lay screaming in the hallway, Mrs. Zioncheck called the police.

A rare repetition of the first scene followed, with Mrs. Young dragging her into the apartment and couch and calling for her doctor.

Pleading with the Zionchecks and Mrs. Young to go to bed, the police again insisted it was a civil case and they had no jurisdiction.

Service Suspended
Train service between Tientsin and Shanhaikwan, at the eastern end of China's great wall, was suspended, and one train, loaded with Japanese troops, failed to arrive here from Tangku.

Complicating the already serious situation, another Japanese military train bringing infantry reinforcements to Tientsin narrowly escaped destruction when a charge of explosives was set off under the rails over which the cars were running.

SHANGHAI, May 30. (P)—Two thousand Shanghai students paraded the streets today, shouting epithets against Japan and waving huge banners in an anti-Japanese demonstration similar to that held Thursday by Tientsin students.

The demonstrators, under the herding of scores of police, were shunted from the business district without incident.

"Faithful to a tradition which is dear to us, Belgium decorates today the graves of the American soldiers who fell on her soil during the great war."

"I associate myself with all my heart in this sacred duty. I renew on this occasion to the American nation the attestation of the profound gratitude and friendship of the Belgian people."

President Roosevelt replied:

"I thank your majesty for your Decoration Day message and the friendly sentiments you thereby convey, which I cordially reciprocate. The heartfelt thoughtfulness with which your majesty and the Belgian people continue to keep in remembrance the American dead interred on Belgian soil touches the hearts of the American people, and is greatly appreciated by me."

A plea for the preservation of traditional ideals of democracy in government lest the American people "become the prey of a dictator," was voiced by General Pershing.

Way Clears For Return Here of Kidnap Suspects

Developments Friday indicated that the return of three youths charged with the kidnaping of Charles Davis of Reno would be effected next week without further delay.

District Attorney Hardin C. Blackmer, in a telephone conversation with the U. S. district attorney for Idaho, learned that the federal official would approve release of the youths from a Pocatello, Ida., jail, where they are being held on Dyer act charges, for prosecution in Klamath county.

Final authority for release of the prisoners, it developed, rests with the department of justice bureau at Butte, Mont. The U. S. attorney said he was getting in touch with the federal agents there, and that the release order should follow soon after.

Meanwhile, District Attorney Blackmer was preparing extradition papers for Sheriff Low to take along with his warrants when he goes to Pocatello for his prisoners. This was a precaution being taken in event the three youths should refuse to waive extradition.

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SPEED BREAKS RECORDS FOR TRACK CLASSIC

In 2:15:03.59, to average 111.059 miles an hour. This broke the record of 109.429 miles an hour made by Freddie Frame, Los Angeles, in 1933.

At the halfway mark, nine of the original 32 starters had dropped out due to motor trouble. Stapp, who had led the race for about 50 miles, was forced out when a rear axle broke while he was tearing down the back stretch. The speeding car swerved, but Stapp kept it under control.

Car Wrecked
In full sight of thousands of spectators in the stands lining the track, a car driven by Al Miller, Detroit, was wrecked while tearing down the stretch at terrific speed. Miller was injured and rushed to the hospital. It was the first major accident of the race.

The extent of Miller's injuries was not immediately determined. He apparently had a broken hip. The race slowed down while the wrecked car was dragged off the course. Miller's mechanic, Jimmy Jackson, Indianapolis, leaped from the swerving car to safety. The car apparently blew a tire.

SPEEDWAY, INDIANAPOLIS, May 30 (P)—Breaking all track records for the distance, Wilbur Shaw, Indianapolis, was leading the 500 mile automobile race today at the end of the first 100 miles with Egbert "Dabe" Stapp of Los Angeles only eight seconds behind him.

Shaw covered the first hundred miles in 1:49:35 for an average of 115.757 miles an hour, smashing the previous record of 112.246 miles an hour hung up by Freddie Frame, Los Angeles, in 1933.

Billy Winn, Detroit, was third, Floyd Roberts, Van Nuys, Calif., fourth and George Connor, Los Angeles, fifth, each a lap behind the flying leaders. The 23-year-old Rec Mays, Los Angeles, was trailing way back due to being forced into the pits when a pin dropped out of his foot throttle.

The Los Angeles youngster, pre-race favorite with the crowd, had set a blistering pace until misfortune overtook him.

The terrific pace caused three of the original 32 starters to drop out before 100 miles had been reeled off. Wild Bill Cummings, winner of the 1935 race, failed to start because his clutch stuck. Jimmy Snyder, Chicago, surrendered to motor trouble after going 50 miles. Johnny Seymour, Eacanaba, Mich., quit at 35 miles because of a faulty clutch. Freddie Frame, Los Angeles, lasted only seven and a half miles. A broken spring forced him out.

The first casualty occurred when a youth named Joe Meyers, Streator, Ill., fell out of a tree while watching the race and probably sustained a broken back.
