

LIBRARIANS HOLD MEET HERE TUESDAY

Branch librarians from the county library system met in all-day session at the county library, Tuesday.

Klamath county library system ranked third in the number of patrons borrowing books, fourth in the number of books circulated, sixth in the number of volumes in the library, and seventh in income, among the seven largest libraries in Oregon, exclusive of the Multnomah county library at Portland, according to the annual report of public libraries in Oregon, which was presented during the morning session.

Miss Mary McComb and Miss Betty Zimmerman gave reports of the Pacific Northwest Library association sessions on children's reading, books for young people, reading tastes of the general public and on how to provide for the reader who specializes.

Different forms of library aids were discussed and it was decided that the larger branch libraries should have the use of book review magazines and indexes for magazines.

R. C. Groesbeck, president of the Klamath county library board, gave an address of welcome and pointed out some of the chief problems with which the library system is confronted. One of the greatest needs of the library according to Groesbeck is for more books to accommodate the demands of the reading public.

Several of the branch librarians reported a wider range of reading interests among their borrowers, than heretofore.

At the close of the meeting each librarian selected books to take to her branch library. These will be placed in circulation at once.

BANKER MORGAN REPORTED ILL

NEW YORK, July 1. (AP)—J. Pierpont Morgan, the financier, suffering from neuritis that made walking painful, was taken to his Long Island estate at Glen Cove today and placed under medical care.

Two sons of the 69-year-old banker, Junius and Henry, were at the Mill Neck station of the Long Island railroad when a special car to which their father had been carried by stretcher and ambulance yesterday at West Manchester, Mass., arrived.

Junius Morgan said: "There's nothing wrong. He just needs rest. The doctors decided he had better come home and rest awhile."

The banker's sister, Mrs. Stephen V. Crosby, with whom he has been visiting in Massachusetts, said her brother was only "slightly ill." Dr. George Denay, who attended him there,

said his condition was not serious.

The private car was taken to Long Island after lying on a siding about an hour and a half in New York's Pennsylvania station.

The use of the stretcher and ambulance in transporting him to the train for his homecoming was said only to have been to spare the elderly banker the pain of walking. The neuritis was said to have affected his legs and arms.

SHOE MARKET BUYING HEAVY

Chet Smith, manager of the shoe department in Adrienne's, is just back from the Pacific Northwest Shoe Retailers' convention in Seattle with word that this year's fall buying is the heaviest in 11 years of Seattle meetings.

Smith reports that more lines are being shown than ever before, with the trend towards higher priced lines. Green, grey and wine will be the outstanding new colors for fall, he said.

WORLD'S SURPLUS OF WHEAT LOWER

WASHINGTON, July 1. (AP)—The world wheat surplus was estimated today by the bureau of agricultural economics at 388,000,000 bushels—the smallest in nine years.

This surplus as of July 1 in Argentina, Australia, Canada and the United States, the principal exporting nations, compared with 522,000,000 bushels a year ago, 741,000,000 in 1934 and 789,000,000—an all-time peak—in the summer of 1933.

The bureau added the world carry-over also would be the smallest in nine years—a total of 635,000,000 bushels as of July 1 compared with 856,000,000 a year ago and 1,105,000,000 two years ago.

The United States carry-over was reported at 125,000,000 bushels, the smallest since July 1, 1928. This compared with 152,000,000 in 1935; 285,000,000 in 1934, and 393,000,000 on July 1, 1933, which was an all-time high.
