reported a second torrential rainfall starting at 9 p. m. One section of the city was inundated.

Thousands of acres of corn and cotton crops were washed away.

Cattlemen, caught by the suddenness of the rain, estimated hundreds of head of cattle were lost in the lowlands.

The Gualalupe had risen to 33 feet, five feet above flood stage, and was rising at the rate of two feet per hour.

Farther north at Rockdale the heaviest rain since 1900, 12.15 inches, flooded the Ham Branch creek and sent water coursing into the city.
