MERRILL, July 1.—Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Jinnette announce the coming marriage of their daughter, Miss Faye Jinnette, to Frank Merrill, Corvallis. The ceremony, planned for simplicity, will take place Saturday morning, July 4, at 10 o'clock at the Presbyterian manse, Merrill, with the Rev. Forest C. Traville, pastor of the Merrill Presbyterian church, officiating.

Vows of the young couple will be taken before a bow of roses in the manse garden. They will be unattended.

The bride-elect will wear her mother's wedding gown, made in the mode of the early 1900s, very full with high neck and long sleeves, and fashioned from tulle and lace with Manila. Her bouquet will be of tea roses, and she will wear a coronet of bridal roses.

### DECISION DEFERRED ON BOND ELECTIONS

TULELAKE, July 1.—Decision on the advisability of holding a second election for issuance of \$25,000 in bonds for financing a building for an elementary school here was held in abeyance until further word is received from PWA headquarters at Washington. It was announced Tuesday by O. A. Schultz, chairman of the board, following a meeting held Monday evening in the high school gymnasium.

Englebright, state representative, stating that the application for a loan and grant in the sum of \$29,091 placed months ago with the PWA has been acted upon favorably, and completion of details waits an appropriation by congress.

### JUDGE ALTERS WAIVER STAND

Judge E. B. Ashurst, long-time foe of couples who wished to marry in a hurry, has turned over a new leaf on waiving of the three-day marriage requirement, perusal of the big marriage register at the county clerk's office indicated Tuesday.

During the first two days of this week, the circuit judge waived the requirement in the cases of five out of the eight couples who applied for licenses on those days. In the year and a half preceding, during which the waiver right had been under the sole jurisdiction of the circuit court, Judge Ashurst had authorized only two waivers.

In allowing the waivers, however, the judge retains the spirit of the three-day law by requiring the applicants to obtain a letter of recommendation from their officiating minister.

### Covadonga's Wife Files For Divorce

HAVANA, Cuba, July 1. (UP) Countess Covadonga, Cuban wife of the former heir to the Spanish throne, will begin suit for divorce "within a day or two" on a charge of incompatibility, she told the United Press Tuesday. The countess said she would bring suit in Cuban courts. "I want only complete freedom and will not seek alimony," she said. "Later I may seek annulment of my marriage at the Vatican."
