

Yankees Blast Red Sox From Second Place

BOSTON LOSES SIXTH IN ROW

Gold-Plated Club Having Tough Going While N. Y. Climbs.

Mr. Tom Yawkey, from all indications, will be a wiser, if not a sadder, young man by the time the American league race has run its course.

The big ivory hunter from Boston is finding out almost daily that the million dollars, more or less, he threw into building up the glittering array of Red Sox won't buy the American league pennant.

Sixth in Row Lost
In fact, from the way things are

going now, it's highly doubtful if the at present slightly-tarnished gold-plated lineup will finish one-two in the current pennant chase.

The Sox sank out of second place Wednesday, dropping their sixth straight game as the Yankees made it three in a row over the Bostonians with a 5-0 victory, to stretch their league lead to 10 1/2 games. The Tigers, who seem to have recovered somewhat from the loss of Manager Mickey Cochrane, took over the runner-up position with their fifth straight win, a tremendous 21-6 scoring spree against the White Sox.

Giants Go Down
The Detroiters expressed the trend of the day for the league, as pitchers came at a dime-a-dozen against slugging bats on all sides. The lowly St. Louis Browns blasted the Indians 16-12 in the first game of a double-header, and deadlocked the almost as wild-bitting nightcap, 5-5, called in the ninth because of darkness. Meantime, the Senators, who went into a tie with the Red Sox for third place, teed off against Connie Mack's pitching youngsters with

a total of 32 hits, for a twin bill win, 13-5 and 14-4.

The hurling brigade had a slightly better time in the National league, although the Pirates belted three St. Louis pitchers for 15 hits and a 9-4 win, to cut the Cards' lead to half a game over the Cubs, who were rained out at Cincinnati. The Giants were shoved deeper into the second division when the Bees came through, 8-6, and the Phillies stayed out of the cellar by splitting a double-header with the Dodgers, winning 10-3, after losing the opener 6-1 to Van Mungo's three-hit pitching.

American Star Reaches Finals of Net Tourney

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 2. (AP)—Helen Jacobs of Berkeley, Calif., four times American champion, gained the final round of the all-England tennis championship today with a 6-4, 6-2 victory over Jadwiga Jedzejowska of Poland.

Miss Jacobs' opponent in the final to be played Saturday will be Frau Hilda Krahwinkel Sperling of Germany and Denmark. Frau Sperling conquered Mme. Simone Mathieu of France, 6-3, 6-2.

For Miss Jacobs, her victory today atoned for two previous defeats suffered at the hands of the plump Polish star and marked the third straight year and the fifth time since 1925 that she has reached the final in this tournament. Frau Sperling was an unsuccessful finalist five years ago. A crowd of more than 14,000 witnessed the play.

The Polish player, displaying a smoking service and forehand, proved a formidable antagonist, especially in the first set. Miss Jacobs' drives were no match for Jadwiga's thunderbolts, so the American title-holder went back to her famous chop stroke, and Miss Jedzejowska became another victim of this soft and tantalizing weapon.

In the first set it appeared to be anybody's match until Jadwiga's control fell completely apart, and Helen broke through her serve in the vital tenth game. Thereafter, Miss Jacobs used the chop almost to the exclusion of her other weapons, and permitted Miss Jedzejowska few forehand shots in the second set.

While Miss Jacobs and Frau Sperling rest tomorrow, the men's championship will be decided between Fred Perry, the defending title-holder, and Baron Gottfried von Cramm of Germany.

LEADERS AGAIN BAT OUT WINS

Pitching Features Games in Coast League Wednesday Night.

Neat pitching performances, punctuated by the perfect hitting of the Missions' Harry Rosenberg, left the positions of Coast league teams unchanged with only 5 1/2 games separating fifth and first place teams.

Barrel-legged Wes Schulmerich spoiled Howard Craghead's bid for no-hit fame as the rejuvenated San Diegoan blanked Los Angeles, 2-0, in the finest hurling stunt of the present series.

Ducks Lose Second
Rosenberg collected five for five against the San Francisco Seals to lead the San Francisco Missions to an 8-4 triumph, while the pace-setting Seattle club trounced Portland, 6-2, and Oakland hammered out a 5-0 decision over Sacramento.

Don Koupal was in a pitching mood, which coupled with a Seattle flurry in the first inning, caused Portland's second successive downfall in the north.

The Indians perennial mound star restricted the Heavers to four singles, while his teammates took advantage of three hits and two errors in the initial canto to tally four times and win easily.

Wins Four In Row
Craghead has proved an enigma to Coast leaguers since his transfer to San Diego from Seattle, where he lost seven games and won only two.

Wednesday night he won his fourth in a row for the Padres in most impressive fashion, holding every searaph but Schulmerich hitless for nine innings. Big Wes touched him for a double and single.

The Reds made it two up on the Seals, with Rosenberg's triple, two doubles and two singles aiding in scoring four runs. The Seals made a battle of it for seven innings, but the Missions went ahead in the eighth and aided by breaks in the ninth, added three more runs for good measure.

Sacramento was completely handcuffed by Jack Larocca, and got only four singles off the Acorn ace. Oakland fielders had an easy time of it, Larocca striking out 12 Solons and allowing only three balls to be hit out of the infield.

Oregon State Directors Plan Sports Program

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis.—Plans for the coming year's sports program for the Oregonians were thrown into high gear after a period of "idling" with the announcement by the new athletic board that Carl Lodell will continue as manager-director on indefinite appointment and that George Scott, alumni secretary, will give part-time service as assistant manager.

Approval was also given for the employment on a full-time basis of a freshman coach who will handle all four major freshman sports. Final appointment of the new coach was delayed for a time pending completion of detailed financial budgets, though negotiations were carried on to obtain the services of a man who could strengthen the rook sport program, recently dependent on constantly changing personnel.

Meanwhile the new board and the manager announced the continuance of the present major varsity sports staff. These include Lon Stiner, head football coach; "Slate" Gill, basketball and baseball coach; Jim Dixon and Hal Moe, assistant football coaches.

Addition of Scott to the manager's office completes a closer relationship between the campus athletic program and alumni interests, and affords the part-time services of one well known throughout the state high school athletic circles. He was formerly a star halfback on the Beaver team and later coach at Baker high school.

The Staters are facing probably their most inclusive coast schedule in history this fall when the first season of the "round-robin" conference schedule takes effect. With the best team prospects in a number of years, those in charge are looking forward to an interesting fall season.

While there were a number of candidates for the managership, the board decided to retain its present experienced leadership of proved capability to handle this impending "campaign." A change this late, it was said, would be dangerous regardless of the quality of aspirants. Reorganization was made necessary by the separation of educational from athletic student activities which followed defeat of the uniform student fee bill.

Omaha Defeated for Second Time

NEWMARKET, England, July 2, (AP)—The second bid of William Woodward of Omaha for a stake victory in England again ended in defeat today as the American 1935 champion three-year-old ran second to the Aga Khan's Taj Akbar in the one and one-half mile Princess of Wales stake. James A. de Rothschild's Esquemeling was third. Six ran.

Taj Akbar, the second betting choice at 4 to 1, beat off Omaha, the odds-on favorite at 5 to 11, by a neck. Five lengths separated the American horse and Esquemeling, a 9 to 1 shot.

Omaha met with a similar heart-breaking defeat a fortnight ago in the classic Gold Cup race. He was vanquished by a nose by Lord Stanley's filly, Quashed.
