BATTERY WINS HIGH HONORS

HEARING LISTED FOR JULY 16-18

Battery "D," with its 60 men and three officers, returned Wednesday evening from annual encampment at Fort Stevens, bringing honors and decorations for excellent work in various activities.

Major General George A. White personally congratulated Captain D. E. Van Vactor of Battery "D," after the local battery was recognized as the outstanding marching unit in the review of the 249th regiment.

Major General White also decorated the guidon of the battery with a ribbon in recognition of five years satisfactory rating. The local battery achieved the highest score in service practice last week, scoring 35 points out of a possible 40. Ten-inch disappearing carriage rifles were used, carrying projectiles weighing 610 pounds, and approximately 150 pounds of powder. Five direct hits were achieved, giving a 25 point score; two hits in the next range gave a score of eight, and one in the outer circle gave three points, making up the mark of 35.

The battery's total shooting score for the entire encampment period was 116.8, and 95 is considered excellent, according to officers.

Private Leonard B. Kinney brought honors to the battery by placing first in the hurdle race on field day, when representatives from the entire national guard participated.

The 249th medical detachment took second place out of the entire national guard for its first aid demonstration.

Battery "D" received many compliments from inspectors for its range section under the command of Lieutenant G. D. Powell, and also on its gun section under Lieutenant F. D. Case.

Members of the battery enjoyed good health during the encampment, with not a man reporting sick during the period. The food was good, and all returned happy and in good health after their stay at Fort Stevens.

The national guardsmen were quartered in the CCC barracks instead of in the regular army barracks as heretofore, Captain Van Vactor reported upon his return.

A. F. Harvey, in charge of the

motor tariff bureau, stated in a letter to this newspaper:

"It is important that all parties interested in this proceeding attend the hearing in order that the commission may ascertain all the facts and information with respect to the local conditions and to the need for revisions in freight rates and charges."

"We desire the attendance of both motor carriers and the shipping public. The matter under investigation is of vital importance to the shippers as well as to the motor transportation industry."

A hearing will also be heard at the Lako county court house on July 15, beginning at 9 a. m.
