POSTAL RECEIPTS OVER LAST JUNE

Postal receipts for June totaled \$7,667.12, showing a gain of 18.26 per cent over June of last year when \$6,482.97 was taken in.

Receipts for the June quarter, 1936, totaled \$24,237.09, or a gain of 7.7 per cent over the same period in 1935, when the figure was \$22,503.78.

In past quarters the gain has been figured between 10 and 15 per cent, and the lower percentage of the June quarter was due to the heavy chain letter mail in 1935.

If receipts for the June quarter in 1936 had been of normal average, the present gain could be figured at about 16 per cent, according to Postmaster Burr Hawkins.

Gain in receipts is due to a steady increase in volume of business at the Klamath Falls postoffice, officials said.

congress because he had learned a lot about insane asylums. "If I were governor," he said, "I would have charge of all the insane asylums in the state and I would get rid of a lot of these so-called insanity experts."

Angered at Spokane He was indignant about the reception given him in Spokane last night. He said he secreted himself in a compartment of the train because he would not appear "just to be ribbed by a bunch of curiosity hounds."

"What the hell — Spokane didn't elect me to congress," he said.

The congressman was still resentful over his incarceration in a Maryland mental hospital. He blamed Postmaster General Farley and "others high in President Roosevelt's estimate."

"They wanted to keep me out of the newspapers and out of congress just before and during the national democratic convention," he said.

"I know Farley was one of them and I know others were in on it. I'm doing some checking and I'll expose the whole bunch of them soon."

"What's more, they expected to keep me chained and shackled in the place until it would be too late for me to file for re-election."

"Persons who said they were my friends stabbed me in the back and if I hadn't jumped the fence I'd still be there. I knew if they kept me there much longer I certainly would go crazy."

Other passengers on the train said Zionscheck was a "changed man" after his bride got aboard the train.

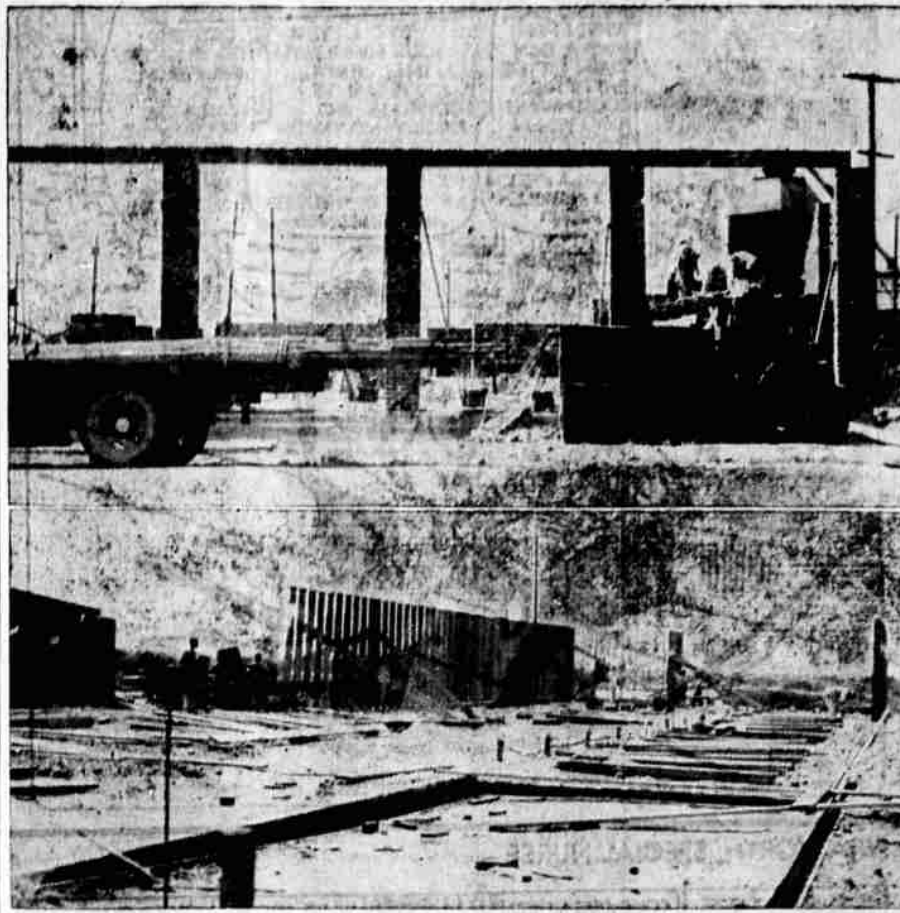

CHILD BURNED IN AUTOMOBILE FIRE

Five-year-old Norman See, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold See, sustained painful burns about the head and face, and his hair was partially singed Wednesday noon, when the automobile in which he was riding with his father burst into flames as the result of a backfire.

See and the little boy were driving toward their home, when the machine ignited from the backfire, and fire burst up into their faces from the engine.

See got the door open and jumped out with the child, while the machine ran wild, crashing into an iron post on the edge of an embankment at 425 North Seventh street.

The man ran to the car, and shut off the motor, extinguishing the blaze with dirt before the arrival of the fire department.

An earlier report erroneously gave See's first name as Edward, his brother, whose machine he was driving, and the owner's name was taken from the registration slip in the automobile by investigating officers.

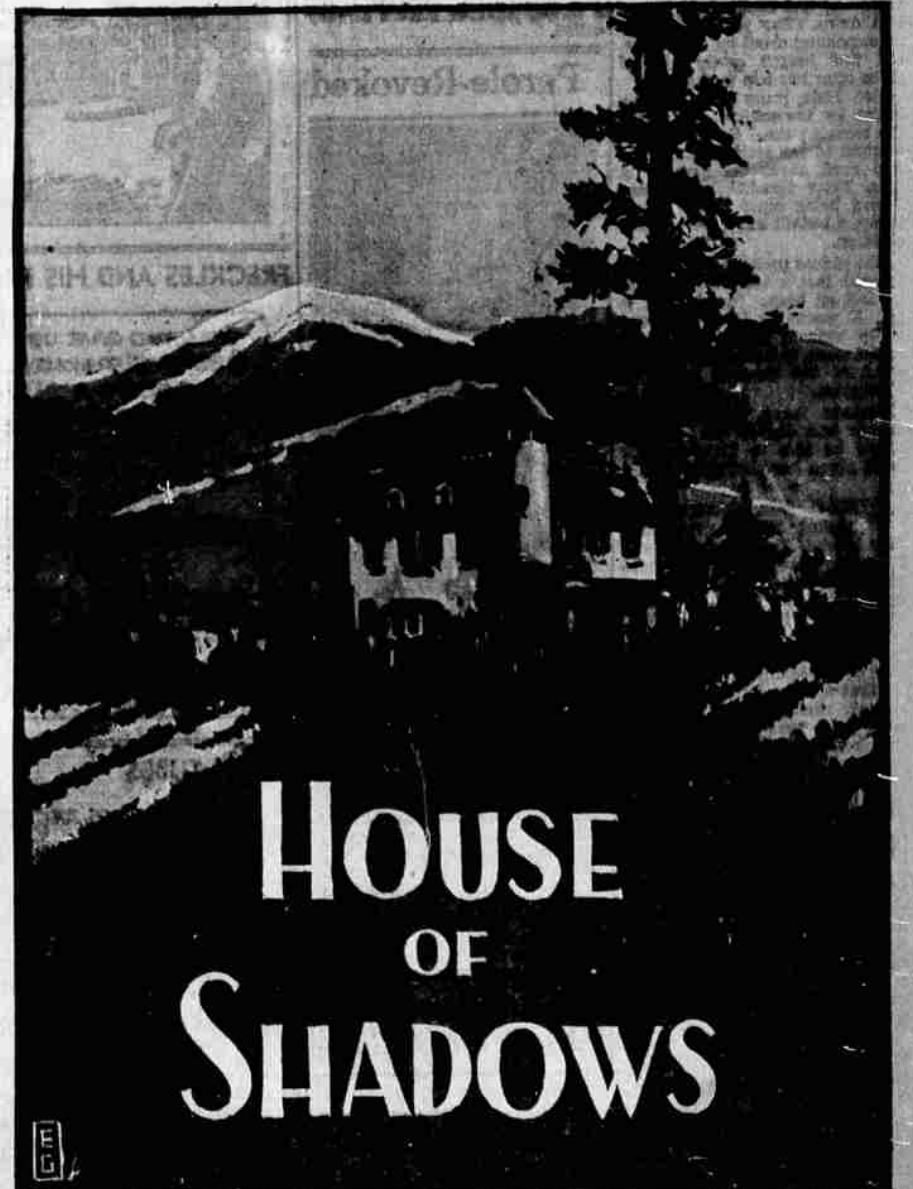
