The pair stand charged with robbing John L. Little, Williams Creek district miner, of \$180, after beating him with an auto crank on a lonely road near Gold Hill, a week ago.

Little sustained a fractured arm and numerous bruises in the combat.

The woman is alleged to have acted as "lure." Little told the authorities he intended to marry her.

## EIGHT DEAD, MANY INJURED OVER OREGON

suffered wounds in a fight and another victim was killed.

**Four Die At Coast**  
The worst automobile accident of the year in which four persons were killed occurred Saturday afternoon, 20 miles from Tillamook, when a machine hurtled over a 75-foot embankment and crashed on Southern Pacific railroad tracks.

The dead were Mr. and Mrs. H. Kelley and Mr. and Mrs. W. A. McDonald, all of Portland. Three died instantly and Kelley lived for an hour. The exact cause of the accident remained unknown but it was believed that Kelley, said to have been driving, skidded on a soft shoulder after passing a truck and shot over the cliff.

Strangely, death for one of the quartet, McDonald, came upon the tracks over which he had traveled many times as a railroad employee.

Two other automobile accidents killed Mrs. J. R. Herman, 71, of Portland, near Independence and K. Shoji, Japanese gardener, at The Dalles.

**Angler Loses Life**  
A fisherman, Howard Atkinson, Portland, lost his life when his boat capsized in Lake Oswego, and Mrs. Phineas Edwards, about 45, drowned in Willamette slough near St. Helens, falling into the water as her husband raised a fish trap.

Fireworks seriously lacerated at least five persons. Donald Watson, 11, Corvallis, suffered a deep throat wound when a firecracker blew a tin can against his neck. B. H. Graves, 51, Portland, suffered gasches of both hips when a trick cigar exploded.

police, Bend, was seriously cut and burned about the mouth when he placed a firecracker between his teeth after the fuse appeared to have gone out.

**Fireworks Injure Dozens**  
Insurance company statisticians predicted that at least 300 persons will die in automobile accidents this week-end and that 150 will drown. The largest toll of injured and dead since July 4, 1931, when 453 were killed, is in prospect because of the large number of persons leaving their homes to celebrate, according to these statisticians.

Fatalities resulting from fireworks were few but today dozens were injured. In Philadelphia two score persons were injured by fireworks bootlegged to children in violation of city ordinances.

**War Veteran Goes Mad**  
A shell-shocked World War veteran, William McKenna, 40, became deranged when firecrackers exploded near him. He seized an axe and killed Eugene Prouty, 53, with two blows on the head. The incident occurred at Vezie, Me.

Donald Watson, 11, of Philomath, Ore., will be speechless for life, physicians at a hospital in Corvallis, Ore., said, because a tin can blown into the air by

a firecracker struck him on the neck, severing his vocal cords.

**Two Die In Jail**

Six were injured in Detroit during a holiday spree when two cars raced through city streets with occupants throwing firecrackers at each other. While police, thinking a gun battle was in progress, pursued, the cars collided.

In St. Louis, 74 persons were treated for burns resulting from fireworks mishaps.

Two men died in the Dallas, Tex., jail where they had been taken because they imbibed too freely in a pre-holiday drinking party. One was killed when he fell from a bench in the jail. The other died from a skull fracture.

## Republican Chiefs Hold Conferences

CHICAGO, July 6. (AP)—National Chairman John D. M. Hamilton called in two of the principal tacticians of the republican party today for a conference on the fall campaign.

Closeted with him in the new national headquarters were Rep. Chester Bolton of Cleveland, and Senator John G. Townsend, Jr., of Delaware, chairmen respectively of the house and senate campaign committees.

Sen. Frederick Steiwer of Oregon, keynote of the Cleveland convention, also conferred with Hamilton. He is on his way to his home in Portland. Steiwer intended to consult Col. Frank Knox during his stop in the city on plans for the Knox notification ceremonies on July 30, he said.
