

## Victory Sends Portland into Third Place

### BEAVERS TRIM SEALS, 8 TO 4

#### Defeat At Hands of Sacs Pushes Missions Into Fourth.

Both weird and sparkling baseball featured coast league games which placed Portland up a notch in the standings today at the expense of the San Francisco Missions.

The Beavers moved into third spot by defeating the San Francisco Seals, 8-4, while the Reds were taking a 2-1 trouncing from Sacramento Senators. The circuit-leading Oaks took a well-played, 2-0 game from San Diego, while Seattle was edging out Los Angeles, 5-3.

Oaks in Fine Form  
The Oaks were in fine form in every department while beating San Diego. They ran to 21 the number of consecutive innings they have held opponents scoreless, by reason of Ken Douglas' five-hit southpawing, Jimmy Hitchcock's timely clubbing, and snappy Acorn fielding.

The San Francisco-Portland game was an odd affair from beginning to end. The first six Beavers hit safely to get off to a 5-0 lead, then Bill Posedel had to be derided in the third after pitching hitless ball when the O'oulmen scored two runs on three walks, an error and an infield out.

Sacs Trim Missions  
Lanky Don French then pitched 5 1/3 innings striking out nine Seals and walking eight. Two of the Seals' three hits scored two earned runs in the ninth. During the game 13 batsmen stroled, two were hit by pitcher, six errors were committed and six double plays completed.

The Sacramento, after three fruitless weeks on the road, looked like champs in their home park against the Missions. They clouded up on Walter Beck and Wayne Osborne in the fifth and sixth frames to score eight runs on nine hits, during which Buster Adams exploded a triple with the bases bulging, and Frank Morehouse hit two homers.

Seattle bearded the Angels in their own enclosure as Kewpie Dick Barrett scored his third successive victory over the losers. The Indians needed the five runs made in the first three innings off Dutch Leiber, for after being held to two hits and one run for eight innings, the Seraphs put on a ninth inning rally that scored two runs. Twenty-seven players saw action.

### ALL-STAR GAME GENERAL FLOP

#### Financial Side of Picture Gloomy; Rookie Plays Badly.

BOSTON, July 8. — Echoes of the biggest financial and freshman flops in the four-year history of the all-star game failed today to deprive National leaguers of their jubilation over turning back the Americans for the first time.

Faced by the great Dick Dean and Carl Hubbell then plucked from danger by the strong right arm of Lonnie Warneke, the Nationals capitalized their superior pitching to squeeze out a 4 to 3 decision under extraordinary circumstances before a crowd that occupied little more than half of the stands at National league field.

Hitters Have Off Day  
Led by Manager Charley Grimm of the Chicago Cubs, the Nationals won because they forced the "breaks", capitalized opportunities and on the whole played smarter baseball. They had their share of luck, but they were primed to win.

The favored Americans lost because their celebrated "murderers' row" was handcuffed by rival pitchers for eight of nine innings, and, sad to relate, because their sensational rookie outfielder, Joe DiMaggio of the Yankees, picked the occasion to experience his oneday slump since he flashed across the star clustered big league sky.

Bronx Cheers for Joe  
Rookie Joe, a National league hero in his first major league season, came to Boston to get the "Bronx cheer" for the first time in his life. Whether suffering from the jitters or just not having "much luck", as he ruefully expressed it, DiMaggio flied with as resounding a note as the attendance.

The California recruit had three chances in the field and missed two of them. Charitable scorers charged him with only one error, but his misplays figured in each of the National leaguers' scoring rallies.

Up five times, against the superb pitching of Dean, Hubbell and Warneke, DiMaggio failed to get the ball out of the infield even once.

Self-Out Talk Hurts  
He left seven men on bases, capping the climax of his dismal day by lining out with the bases full in the seventh, to end the one scoring spurge of the Americans, and popping out in the ninth with the tying run on second base.

Instead of an anticipated sell-out crowd of 42,000 at the old Wigwam, now the "Bee-Hive," the paid attendance numbered exactly 35,534. Although the weather was perfect and the attraction unusual, the gate receipts were little more than \$20,000 and expenses consumed well over half the amount taken in.

The answers appeared to be (1) that too many fans were scared off by continual talk of a "sell-out", ticket speculation, etc., and (2) that it was a physical impossibility, even if the fans had showed up, to sell as many as 25,000 unreserved seats on the day of the game.

From all indications, steps will be taken by the club owners to guard against a similar debacle before the 1937 all-star game is held in Washington, under American league auspices.

### WOLFE COMING TO KLAMATH

Texan Signed for Match Against Pete Belcastro.

Lee Wolfe, the long, lean Texan with the figure-four scissors, comes back to Klamath Falls next Tuesday night for a main event wrestling match.

### Jockey Killed on Race Track

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 8. (AP) Shortly after his mount, Woodhill, stumbled and two other horses piled into them at the Lansdowne Park track, Jerry Snyder, 17, apprentice jockey, died in a hospital here last night.

Snyder, who came here recently from Longacres race track, near Renton, Wash., received a fractured skull, broken ribs and other injuries. The other two jockeys escaped injury.

Snyder pushed his mount to the front at the start of the race, but the horse stumbled and fell leaving the backstretch. The jockey was crushed beneath two horses.

### Fish Industry Sees Menace in Striped Bass

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8. (AP) Word of the capture of a striped bass spread up and down the Columbia river today as commercial fishermen pondered the latest threat to the huge Columbia river salmon industry.

The bass, a pound and a half specimen of salmon's most vicious enemy, was caught in a gill net near Bonneville upstream from Portland by C. H. Rosenreuter, Portland fisherman, and identified by members of the state fish commission.

Rosenreuter said the striped bass exact a terrific toll upon young salmon.

State records show the striped bass migrated northward from California waters and that several have been caught at the mouth of the Columbia.

Fishermen expressed fear that the noted Columbia river salmon run would be wiped out within a few years if the bass caught near Bonneville—the first inland capture on record—heralds a general invasion.

### King Levinsky Meets Another Loss in South

LOS ANGELES, July 8. (AP)—King Levinsky headed back to his native Maxwell street in Chicago today, his current invasion of California fight rings ended in defeat.

Lee Ramage of San Diego applied the finishing touches to the King's west coast last night, winning a 10-round decision before 10,000 fans at the Olympic auditorium.

A closing spurt in the last two rounds, leaving Levinsky bleeding from cuts over both eyes and the mouth and reeling around the ring, left little doubt as to Ramage's margin of victory.

Settling a draw decision several months ago, the two stood toe-to-toe in the final rounds swapping punches. Levinsky, after winning the second, sixth, seventh and eighth, took a beating in the ninth and tenth. Ramage also had a shade in the first, third, fourth and fifth.

Referee Charlie Randolph repeatedly warned both fighters for roughing in the clinches. The Kingfish was ahead in this field.

### Russia To Remain Firmly Communist

MOSCOW, July 8. (UP)—Adoption of the new constitution will not change the basic character of the Soviet government, guided by the communist party under the leadership of Secretary General Josef Stalin, foreign observers agreed Tuesday.

The constitution, expected to be approved with only minor alterations, if any, by the all union congress of Soviets which will be convened November 25, will give only a slightly different form to all that has been and will continue to be true of the Soviet government.
