Illumination of the famous Oregon peak will again be a prelude to the 18th annual Legion climb of the north side of Mount Hood, to be featured on the following day, Sunday, July 19, and which all interested are invited to attend. Snow conditions this year are perfect for an easy ascent of this high peak, and Legion camp will be ready to take care of several thousands of people after noon on the preceding day. All intending to climb must be at Legion camp Saturday night and be ready to leave with the big party by 2:45 a. m. Reaching the summit before noon, climbers will return to camp at about 3 p. m. Sunday.

The Crag Rats, nationally known alpine guides, will have charge of the climb and have a record of many ascents of Mount Hood without accident of any kind.

"My good condition of health is simply a miracle to me."

With members of his family and a few friends gathering to join in a quiet celebration of the event, today was another milestone in Mr. Rockefeller's march to his goal—a century of preparation after which, he once said, he "shall begin to really live."

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Witnesses Tell Of Wild Orgies In Blind School

OAKLAND, Calif., July 8. (UP)—Charges against Joseph M. Kelly, superintendent of the California industrial home for the blind, which were made by the State Federation of Women's clubs, led Tuesday to revelations of wild orgies with prostitutes soliciting inmates in the men's dormitory.

These startling disclosures were brought out when blind inmates were called to testify before Fred B. Wood, counsel for the state personnel board.

Marco Bruno, blind inmate, who had been in the home for seven years, testified freely concerning his part in drunken parties with "wild women" in the institution.

"Prostitutes came into the building frequently," he said. "I knew one by the name of 'Irish Roast,' and another regular visitor was called 'The Powder Monkey.'"

Further testimony concerning the drinking and carousing parties in the dormitory was given by Henry R. Williams, a former inmate.

Williams said the women often came to the home "on business."

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TOURIST TRAVEL RISES SHARPLY

Tourist registration at the Klamath county chamber of commerce is up 35 per cent this month over July of last year, to date, it was reported by Secretary E. C. Reynolds Wednesday.
