

DEWEY POWELL COMMANDER OF LEGION POST

Bonus celebration night and annual election of post officers drew the largest turnout of Legionnaires and guests in years to the regular meeting of the Klamath post at Legion hall Tuesday night. More than 220 were present.

By unanimous vote, Dewey Powell was elected post commander for the new term which starts in August. At the same time and similarly without opposition, Carl Cook was chosen first vice commander, Bob McGhee second vice commander, Bill Canton adjutant and Sam Miller finance officer.

Tie in Committee Race
Tom Young, retiring commander, was named to the executive committee, along with Fred Heilbrunner, Sid Abbott and Hal Ogle. Jack Gallagher, Hermie Foster and Bogue Dale were tied for fifth place in the executive committee vote.

Legionnaires elected as delegates to represent the Klamath post at the Roseburg state convention in August were Commander-elect Dewey Powell, Tom Young, Lee Schwab, Bill Canton, Fred Heilbrunner and Bob McGhee.

Lieutenant in Guard
Powell has long been active in veterans' affairs in Klamath Falls, as well as in civic enterprises. He is a member of the 40 and 8 in addition to being a Legionnaire, and is a lieutenant in Battery D of the Oregon national guard.

New Members Initiated
Several new members were initiated into the Legion Tuesday night, and short addresses given by Powell, Commander Young and Adjutant Canton. Canton, speaking on Legion activities, reported that the Klamath post, with 382 members, is now the fifth largest in Oregon.

BEARS CONTROL WHEAT MARKET

CHICAGO, July 8. (P)—Bears definitely got the upper hand in wheat dealings late today, and Chicago prices in some cases were two cents a bushel down. Reports of continuous rains today in parts of the Canadian dry belt received, with assurances that the rainfall area was spreading and giving extended relief to drought afflicted wheat. Corn receded with wheat, and December corn lost all of its overnight advance, though July and September corn remained relatively strong. Wheat closed nervous, 1 1/2 cents lower to 1 1/4 higher compared with yesterday's finish. July \$1.05 1/2; Sept. \$1.05 1/4. Dec. \$1.05 1/2; corn at \$ decline to 3 1/2 gain. Sept. 79 1/2-80; oats 1/2 off to 3/4 up, and provisions varying from 10 cents setback to 5 cents advance.

George Dewey Blomgren, who narrowly escaped prison sentence by fascist authorities, and nationally known evangelist, world traveler and authority on international conditions, will speak at the Klamath temple Sunday, July 12, at 7:45 p. m.

In an interview with a reporter, Dr. Blomgren disclosed some very interesting facts pertaining to his recent observations abroad. Mussolini is mentally unbalanced, he claims. Stalin is a character comparable to an Al Capone risen to power, and Hitler is the only one of the three genuinely beloved by the great mass of the people.

Blomgren's conclusions are not drawn from the meditation of the fireside. They aren't the bombastic utterances of an axe-grinding politician. On the contrary, these conclusions and many more concerning conditions in this topsy-turvy world are the result of close observations on the scene of action—in Europe itself.

Many experiences have come to Blomgren from his travels in Europe. Twice he had been sent out of Italy for not agreeing with the tenets of fascism. He narrowly escaped being sent to prison by fascist authorities, and he has seen the workings of politically-mad leaders.
