Donations Pour in for U. S. Olympic Team

APPEAL ROUSES SPORTS LOVERS

American Fund Now Only \$75,000 Short of Required Sum.

NEW YORK, July 9, (AP)—The sun began bursting through the thick financial clouds today for Uncle Sam's 1936 Olympic team. Moved out of their lethargy by dramatic, last-minute appeals, sports-loving Americans were pouring money into the Olympic coffers so steadily that there was every indication almost a full force of athletes would represent the United States in the Berlin games.

Trials Yield Funds
On the theory that all promises of committees and donors would be fulfilled, the fund necessary to send a full team was only \$75,000 short today, although total cash on hand left \$125,000 worth of red ink splashed on the American Olympic committee's ledger.

A total of \$10,000 came in late yesterday. The track and field finals at Randall's Island, the men's and women's swim tryouts at Warwick, R. I., and Astoria, L. I., this weekend, are expected to yield more than \$50,000.

"We still have a job ahead of us," said Gustav Kirby, treasurer of the Olympic committee, "but prospects are a hundred per cent brighter than Sunday night. Sports-loving Americans, I think, are realizing the need, and are responding."

Jim Gentile, former captain of the Pennsylvania soccer team, sold his automobile yesterday to get enough money to insure his passage with the field hockey team.

As America's track and field stars drilled hard and long for the final tryouts at Randall's Island in the East river, prospects were high for a sellout crowd for their show Saturday and Sunday.

A force of 5,500 WPA workers labored overtime to get the new stadium ready.

Deaf Race Stands Out
Discussion among the athletes centered on the prospects of the great battle for 100-meter honors at Randall's Island. Jesse Owens, the famed Buckeye bullet, was favored, but information filtered in that his great negro rival, Ralph Metcalfe, had fully recovered from the accident that slowed him up in the A. A. U. games at Princeton last week.

Ted Carpenter, sage of Marquette university where Metcalfe runs, reported the golden avalanche color bearer had run 300 yards in 11.1, for instance, the best time for that distance in his career.

Owens regarded Metcalfe as his foremost rival in the dashes, with Cornelius Johnson of Columbia close behind.

Colorful Figure Of Yukon Ill in Insane Hospital

SEATTLE, July 9, (UP)—"Diamond Tooth Lili," linked indelibly with Dawson's gold rush days of '97 and '98 as a favorite of the saloon and night life, lay critically ill in state hospital for the insane here Wednesday.

Her diamonds gone and her one-time beauty faded to a seamed and haggard face, the former Honora Ornstein, daughter of a wealthy Montana cattleman, remains only a shell of the vivacious beauty who ruled the hearts of the men that made the gold rush days in Alaska. Authorities refused to name the asylum where she is now, but are searching for relatives in an effort to locate what remains of her one-time vast wealth. Rumor once said Lili had diamonds in almost every safety deposit box in Seattle. She inherited \$100,000 from her mother's estate, and Captain of Detectives Marshall Stafford is attempting to locate several apartment houses recorded in her name and ascertained the last remaining vestige of her fortune.

Diamond Tooth Lili, so named because of her lavish display of diamonds, including two in her teeth, led a life of whim and fancy. With each new love, she disinherited the old, and several times she willed immense fortunes to some new person who captured her affections.

Those who lived in the days when her fame was a living thing in the north, said she was never content to hire one taxi—always riding in one and having another follow.

COAST HURLERS HAVE GOOD DAY

Well-Pitched Games Feature of Wednesday's Contests.

Fans who like well-pitched ball games recounted with satisfaction three Coast league tussles Wednesday in which only 11 runs were scored by the six teams involved.

Two 1-0 contests, one of them protested, were recorded while the chuckers held scoring to a minimum. In the third a ninth-inning rally finally produced a winning counter in a pitchers' battle.

Leaders Drop Games
The league-leading Oakland Aorns dropped a 1-0 game to San Diego; the San Francisco Missons took a 1-0 victory over Sacramento; San Francisco edged out Portland, 5-4, and Los Angeles trimmed Seattle 5-2.

Manager Bill Meyer said he would protest the Padre victory on a ruling made by Umpire Leake in the eighth inning when the Aorns seemed set to tie the score when Leroy Anton blasted out a long hit and pulled up at third. The umpire sent him back to second, citing a ground rule in effect when the ball hit a gate. Pitcher Manuel Salvo then disposed of the side, although had Anton been on third he would have scored on a long fly.

Rally Beats Beavers
San Diego's run was unearned in the fifth as Vince DiMaggio, brother of Yankee Joe, was safe on an error, and scored on a single and another boot. The single run nullified the five-hit performance of Ten Conlan and Floyd Lids of the Oaks.

Ed Leishman's home run in the fifth scored the only run in Sacramento as Bill Seimsoth, young Solon pitcher, lost another tough game. He allowed seven hits, one less than Frank Lamanski and Hollis Thurston of the winning team.

Hobo Carson walked in the tying run with the bases loaded in the ninth and Brooks Holder singled home the winning counter as the Seals disposed of Portland. The Beavers, by dint of an eight-inning uprising, seemed to have the game sewed up until three hits and two walks put the Seals ahead.

Johnny Salvo won his 10th game of the season from Seattle, as the Seaphs pounded young Don Osborn hard. The teams were in a 2-2 tie until the sixth, when Los Angeles went ahead.

NEW YORK, July 9, (AP)—Baseball hopefuls of Oregon, before scouts of the New York Yankees, American league leaders, will show their wares at a baseball school to be held in Salem July 13-19.

Youths between the ages of 17 and 22 will be eligible for the school, which will be in charge of Joe Devine, Yankee scout, assisted by "Frisco" Edwards, veteran ballplayer who once caught for Spokane in the old Northwest league and is now manager of a Salem team.

Another scout at the camp will be Bobby Coltrin, of Newark, International league.

Devine said the school would be held annually if successful and youngsters showing promise will be farmed out to clubs in the Yankee string.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 9, (AP) Tor Johnson made short work of Chief Chiwaki in the feature event of Portland's wrestling card, winning two straight falls in 4:30 and 2:15.

The 335-pound Swedish grappler gave the Chief, 235, Indianapolis, all he wanted in the first fall and tied him up to win the second with a rope the Chief himself had brought into the ring.

Steele, Risko Both Confident of Win Friday

SEATTLE, July 9, (AP)—Both predicting their title fight tomorrow night will not go the scheduled 15 rounds, Freddie Steele, Tacoma, and Babe Risko, world middleweight champion, were taking it easy today.

Steele said, "I don't think I will have to go that long, but if I do I don't think the grind will bother me."

Risko said, "Fifteen rounds is my dish. The longer they are the better I like them, but I don't think I will have to travel that many beats."

The odds on the fight were about even, in spite of the fact Steele won a decision over Risko in a 10-round fight here.

Max Baer Interested in Meeting Braddock

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., July 9, (AP)—Ancl Hoffman, manager for Max Baer, hopes his fighter will be pitted to meet Jimmy Braddock in a heavyweight championship battle if negotiations with Max Schmeling fall through, he said here today.

"Madison Square Garden has to provide a suitable opponent for Braddock by July 25," Hoffman said. "The Garden and Mike Jacobs, who controls Max Schmeling, are further apart than ever."

Baer, who expressed himself as serious about his "comeback", fears if Schmeling fought Braddock, he would win the title and take it to Germany, capitalizing on it for a year, then retire.
