the town which has a population of 400 and only a lucky shift in wind turned the flames away from town instead of toward it.

The town, however, was threatened with a serious water shortage. Supplying water to more than 50 neighboring ranches and approximately 1,000 men fighting the forest fire at its edge, Sundaev found itself today without sufficient water for domestic needs.

Ranch Houses Lost

An undetermined number of ranch houses in the forest near Sundaev were reported to have been destroyed and several families in the path of the flames were forced to flee.

BOY SUFFERS FROM THIRST, EXHAUSTION

pneumonia is staved off, his physician said.

Roy seemed to be suffering more from lack of water than from hunger, when he was found. His pockets were full of green cherries with which he had apparently nourished himself during his two days and nights of wandering.

The boy's condition gave horrible evidence of the exposure, exhaustion and panic which he had suffered.

His body was a solid mass of bruises and scratches, supposedly sustained in head-on collision with trees and boulders in the darkness of night in the woods. His eyes were sunken, and his mouth and lips swollen, cracked and bleeding from lack of moisture. He was covered with wood ticks.

Constantly on Go

The distance he covered in his solitary trek and the absence of signs of resting places anywhere along his trail indicated that the lad kept constantly on the go day and night until shortly before his rescue.

At the hospital he shuddered and cried out at every annoying sound, his nerves strained to the limit by his horrifying experience. He was unable to speak.

Crouched Behind Rock

The lost youngster was found at 2:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon by Roy Durham and Frank Phillips of Sprague River, and Mark Sullivan of the state police. He was slightly east of Dam canyon, about seven miles from home. Crouched behind a rock, his hands and mouth full of the cherries, the crippled child watched his rescuers with dilated eyes, and never spoke from the time he was found until he reached the Klamath hospital. His eyes fluttered open and shut as he slept and woke en route to Klamath Falls.

Rescue parties had made arrangements with the child's family earlier in the day that they would rush him to the hospital as soon as he was found, and notify them later.

At about 12:30 p. m. Wednesday the search for the lost child grew hot when Durham and Officer Sullivan found comparatively fresh tracks on an old railroad to a former logging

INSURANCE LAW PHASES EXPLAINED

Oregon's unemployment insurance law was explained in detail to members of the Kiwanis club and their guests at a Willard hotel luncheon Thursday noon by O. R. Hartwig, former member of the state industrial accident commission, and now public relations officer in connection with the operation of the new law.

Hartwig said that the Oregon law is not intended to end unemployment, but it will cushion the shock of unemployment. He discussed effect of the law on employers and employees.

If the Oregon law is found unconstitutional, which Hartwig said he does not believe will happen, funds collected will be refunded, the speaker said.

rapidly drew near a close. Supported by Lowden's republican majority, amendments to the state constitution designed to insure full Kansas participation in federal social security laws had been adopted by the senate and brought to the point of equal ballots in the house.

A band of democratic senators, with frequent references to Lowden's presidential candidacy, had fought to force consideration of the prohibition and civil service questions but the republican majority in a 25 to 10 vote, clamped down a rule limiting the session's business to the social security amendments.

The first, for assistance to needy and dependents, was approved 35 to 1. A 37 to 6 vote put through the second on unemployment.
