Big League Veterans Comeback

Dozen or So Stars Take Places Away from Younger Men.

A dozen or more major league veterans have come back this season to take the play away from younger men.

Ossie Bluege and Red Kress a crackerjack second base combination for Washington.

Pete Appleton, formerly Jabonowski, back from the minors and winning for the Senators in fine fashion.

Red Lucas of the Pirates accounting for seven straight victories since he started his comeback.

Gusie Suhr pacing the Pittsburgh array and near the top of the National League batting list.

Jesus Haines, 42, starting skrimishes for the Cardinals.

Flint Rehm rejuvenated and assisting the Gas House Gang.

Tony Lazzeri helping the Yankees to a long lead.

Pat Malone a standout on the nose too steady pitching staff of the New York Americans.

Al Simmons swatting better than .300 for the Tigers.

George Blaeholder the most effective hurler with Cleveland.

Bing Miller, 42, hitting .338 and filling in acceptably in the Gold Sox outfield while Heinie Manush and Dusty Cooke were injured.

Respectable Danny MacFadden, again under old Bob Quinn, who started him and registered for the Bees, after practically everybody suspected that he was through.

Kiki Cuyler, released by the Cubs last year, hitting .320 and helping to keep the Reds in the National League fight.

In the absence of Buddy Myer, out with a stomach ailment, Bluege has played the grandest game of a grand career at second base for the Nationals, and is on his way to hitting .300 in the junior loop for the first time.

At his side, Kress, basemil, Cinderella Man, has carried like a colt.

While Jimmy Dykes, manager of the White Sox, expresses the opinion that Simmons has shortened his stride, is standing straighter, and hitting everything to left field now, the Milwaukee Pole contends that he hasn't changed his stance particularly.

"The answer to my hitting of the last three weeks is that I finally have loosened up," explains Simmons. "It sounds rather silly to say that I tightened up for a year and a half, but that's the truth. I simply got into a slump, and that I needed to put on a big spurt to get up there again, and the more I thought about it the worse I got."

"Now I'm relaxed once more. When you once get a reputation as a hitter it's too bad when you fall off a little. I've been hooded all over the league, but they stopped in Detroit in our last 10 days at home. I think it would make more sense if they booted the guy who never was able to hit."

Lucas has spent 10 years with Cincinnati and Pittsburgh. Last season the redhead won only eight and lost six for the Buccaneers. Pie Traynor was ready to give up on him. Now Lucas leads the senior wheel in pitching percentage.

Never a terrific hitter in his six years with the Corsairs, Suhr slumped sadly at the plate in 1935, and was listed for a down-the-river deal. Now the first baseman is swatting .345 by way of helping Bill Benavenger's boys to cut down the lead of the Cardinals and Cubs. He performed in the all-star game.

Malone appeared washed up last season, only three victories to show against five defeats in his first term as a Yankee under his old Cub boss, Joe McCarthy. The latter's friendship wasn't figured to be a strong enough tie to hold the Irishman on the Ruppert roster.

Now here he is one of the mainstays of the chucking corps.

Blaeholder spent eight years with the Browns and a half term with the Athletics. He won only 7 and lost 11 in 1935. It was reported that his last ball had vanished. Here he is the star of a staff that was figured as the class of the American league at the beginning of the time.

Freddie Steele Favorite for Battle with Risko

SEATTLE, July 10. (AP)—The biggest fight spectacle of the Pacific northwest since Jack Dempsey outpointed Tommy Gibbons in Montana 13 years ago, was ready for production outdoors here tonight with champion Eddie (Babe) Risko—risky his middleweight crown in a 15-round battle with Freddie Steele of Tacoma.

It was considered a real risk, too, for the Structure mauler, as he took a bad beating from Steele in a non-title bout here last March.

The latest odds were 10 to 7 in favor of the two-fisted Tacoma slugger, and many north-west fans were predicting the crowning of a new champion—sort of an annual event in the middleweight division the last five years. Six different battlers have held the title since Mickey Walker vacated the throne in 1931.

A crowd of 40,000 was expected to jam the Seattle baseball park for the big show. Several thousand fans planned to come from Steele's home in Tacoma with a hope of cheering their protégé to victory.

Promoter Nate Druxman, keeping one eye on the weather as he checked over last minute details, predicted a gate of \$75,000. He had cause for some concern after the weatherman forecast "unsettled conditions."

He admitted he already was "in the clear" on the fight even though he guaranteed Risko \$26,000 and Steele \$18,000.

At the weighing-in exercises this afternoon the champion was expected to scale just under the limit of 160 pounds and Steele three or four pounds less.

"I'm not going to fool around trying to box Steele this time," said Risko. "I'm going to toss a lot of leather and if I don't stop Freddie it will be because they carry me out."

The Tacoma boy, who hasn't lost a fight in four years and has scored 36 knockouts in 86 bouts, said "All I want is a chance for one punch."
