NORTHWEST GRAIN OUTLOOK FAVORABLE

SPOKANE, Wash., July 10. (AP)—While the drought burned deeper into grain lands of the middle west, farmers of the Pacific northwest's inland empire rejoiced today at prospects of a bountiful spring wheat harvest.

With prospects of a crop to bulge the region's storage facilities, the farmers also envisioned higher prices, skyrocketed by the misfortune of the drought area.

The price was more than 10 cents a bushel higher today than a week ago.

The current quotation on predominant soft wheat is 90 cents at Pacific coast terminals, which gives the inland farmers from 70 to 75 cents, depending on the shipping distance.

Generous rains during the vital June growing period added to the favorable outlook in Oregon, Idaho and Washington.

Hope said that a month ago, "the farmer who reduced his acreage was the one who was doing the right thing, according to the administration program."

"Today," he continued, "there are no kind words for that farmer but instead the ones who rejected the program are extolled by the president. One is led to wonder if it is now the president's idea that the farmer who increased his acreage is entitled to the payment of benefits rather than the farmer who reduced."

CANTON MAY JOIN CENTRAL AUTHORITY

CANTON, China, July 10. (AP)—A report the Canton government is willing to abolish its semi-independent status and reorganize the army under central government control circulated in authoritative quarters tonight.

Several military commanders were arrested and others were reported under surveillance, following the alleged desertion of Gen. Li Han-Wen, vice commander of the second Kwangtung army.

Gen. Yu Han-Mow, commander of the first army, went to Nanking by airplane and it was said he was making peace overtures to the central government, fearing otherwise there would be desertions by most of the Canton aviators and navy officers.
