Company Second in Accident Reduction

L. A. Schmitt, agent for General Petroleum corporation in Klamath Falls, has just received news showing that, in the first four months of this year, this company took second place among all major oil companies of the nation in accident reduction, in this department.

"Our records for five and a half months show that our marketing department has registered but one lost-time accident in this entire period," said Schmitt. "However, in six weeks following the report, there was not a single disabling accident in the marketing division of General Petroleum, including truck drivers, salesmen and managers driving cars, bulk plant operators and service station operators, approximately 1,500 persons in California, Oregon, Washington, Nevada and Arizona, conducting the business of selling and dispensing Mobilgas, Mobiloil and other Mobil products from plants to the motoring public."

Bull Frog Hunting Develops New Klamath Sport

A start has been made in the Klamath country, already a mecca for nimrod and anglers, toward the establishment of a new attraction for outdoor sportsmen—the ancient and honorable sport of bull frog hunting.

The banks of Lost river and the tule marshes of Lower Klamath lake may soon be booming with the deep-throated croakings of the offspring of 30 bull frogs brought in and "planted" there last Sunday by S. J. Coull, Standard Oil company manager, and Howard Strode, salesman.

The huge frogs, some of them measuring 18 inches from the tip of the nose to the end of their spread hind legs, were secured from a man in the Sacramento district who catches them in their wild state to sell. They passed the inspection of Charles Riley, game commissioner, who stated that they were among the largest he had seen. Frog propagation here is a "great idea," he said, since they feed on the flies and insects which have become such a pest.

They were planted in spots pronounced ideal for their perpetuation and since each female frog lays from five to ten thousand eggs a season, next year should produce a bumper crop of tadpoles if the pelicans don't get wise to their presence before they have a chance to get off to a good start.

In the Russian and American rivers of California, frog hunting is an established sport, the amphibian being highly prized for the hind-leg meat which is a great delicacy served at fancy prices in metropolitan restaurants. It is said that there is more meat on the hind leg of an adult bull frog than there is on the drumstick of a spring chicken.

There are three accepted ways of capturing the genus Rana. Perhaps the greatest sport is to drift down a stream at night in a boat, spotting them by the glow of their bright eyes and popping them off with a .22.

Night stalking may also be done with a fish line equipped with a piece of white flannel attached about six inches above the hook at the end. A flashlight is played on the flannel, and when the unwary frog leaps for it, he is snagged by the hook.

By daylight, a piece of red flannel is substituted for the white, and the same procedure followed minus the flashlight.

"Strode and I figured that since we'd taken so much game from

the Klamath country, we'd even things up a bit by importing these frogs," said Coull in commenting on their venture.
