MOOSE CONVENTION PRIZES ANNOUNCED

The Moose convention committee has announced cash and trophy prizes for competitive teams coming to Klamath Falls later this month for the state convocation.

The events and the prizes are as follows:

Drill Team Contest—for men First prize—cash—\$200.00 and Dick Miller trophy (Locke Motor Co.)

Second prize—cash—\$100.00, Third prize—cash—\$50.00.

Quartet Competition—(Male vocal quartets) First prize—cash—\$100.00, and Elmer Balsiger trophy (Balsiger Motor company).

Second prize—cash—\$50.00, Third prize—cash—\$25.00.

Ritualistic Contest—(Moose lodge initiatory work) First prize—cash—\$100.00, and Cream River Dairy-Medco Land Leasing trophy.

Second prize—cash—\$50.00, Third prize—cash—\$25.00.

Best musical display—bands—Drum and Bugle corps, etc.—(Character, clown, dress or uniform).

One prize—cash—\$100.00.

Man Mile Attendance—Lodge showing largest man mile attendance at meeting—one prize—E. E. Benner trophy.

One other lodge contest will be competition in membership gain. The lodge showing the greatest numerical gain between the 1935 convention and the 1936 convention will be the winner. This is a very competitive field and a coveted honor to Moose lodges. A trophy will be the award for the winner of this contest. At the present writing no sponsor has been announced for this trophy.

All convention trophies are on display at Bertram's Jewelry store at 325 Main street, where the public may see them. Other prizes will be announced later.

It is further understood that the lodge of northern California will be allowed to compete for these prizes, which should bolster the attendance record of the Moose to a large extent.

Not unlike other affairs of this nature, the Moose committees are planning on having a convention queen also. Rules and regulations governing this contest and the ultimate prize have not been announced at this time. This announcement will be before the people of this city at an early date.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, July 11. (AP)—Stocks generally hurriedly profit-taking with comparative ease in today's market, a number galloping into new high territory for the year or longer with gains of fractions to 2 or more points.

The turnover of around 750,000 shares was the best for a Saturday since last April. The close was firm.

The continuation of the recovery, brokers said, was due largely to the persistent belief that business and industry will maintain their current stamina despite seasonal influences.

Numerous issues attracted buyers because of the revival of rumors in Wall street of nearby dividend boosts because of exceptionally satisfactory earnings and the disinclination of corporations to pay large taxes on undistributed surpluses.

Brought news was still depressing, but the financial sector was hopeful that the results might not be as bad as predicted. Waning of steel strike fears was an aid to the upward movement.

Rails and specialties turned in the best performance. Conspicuous gainers included the Santa Fe, Atlantic Coast Line, Delaware and Hudson, N. Y. Central, Southern Pacific, Southern Railway, Preferred Issues of Allegheny Corp., Spiegel-May-Stern, Hiram Walker, Westinghouse, General Electric, Dupont, Coca-Cola, Evans Products, Consolidated Edison, Western Union, North American, Atlantic Gulf and Johns-Manville.

Douglas Aircraft, which sank and rallied yesterday when its "rights" were dealt in for the first time, again found support and pushed up more than 4 points at its best.

Holdings of rail stocks derived much satisfaction from statements indicating that not only is freight traffic showing substantial improvement over a year ago, but

passenger volume is expanding substantially.
