Denton and Jackson plan to operate a regular business of supplying pack outfits to anyone wishing to make trips into country otherwise inaccessible. They have 12 horses available, including six pack horses and six saddle animals. All necessary equipment, such as camp outfits, pack and riding saddles, is furnished. Headquarters for the new venture are at Denton's park, four miles north of Fort Klamath on the Grater lake highway.

Recently, the two men equipped pack outfits for Mr. and Mrs. George Boussum of seven-mile ranger station near Fort Klamath, where Boussum is stationed as ranger. The couple made the trip to Seven Lakes by means of saddle and pack horses furnished by Denton and Jackson, and reported a most enjoyable outing, the scenery in the vicinity of Seven Lakes being unsurpassed for natural beauty. Fine catches of fish were made on the two days they were at Seven Lakes by Mr. and Mrs. Boussum, who state that fishing conditions are excellent, and that they secured their limit on each day in an hour's time.

a special guest for the evening. The group will meet next on the evening of July 22, when Mrs. Harold Wilmer will entertain at her home in Fort Klamath.

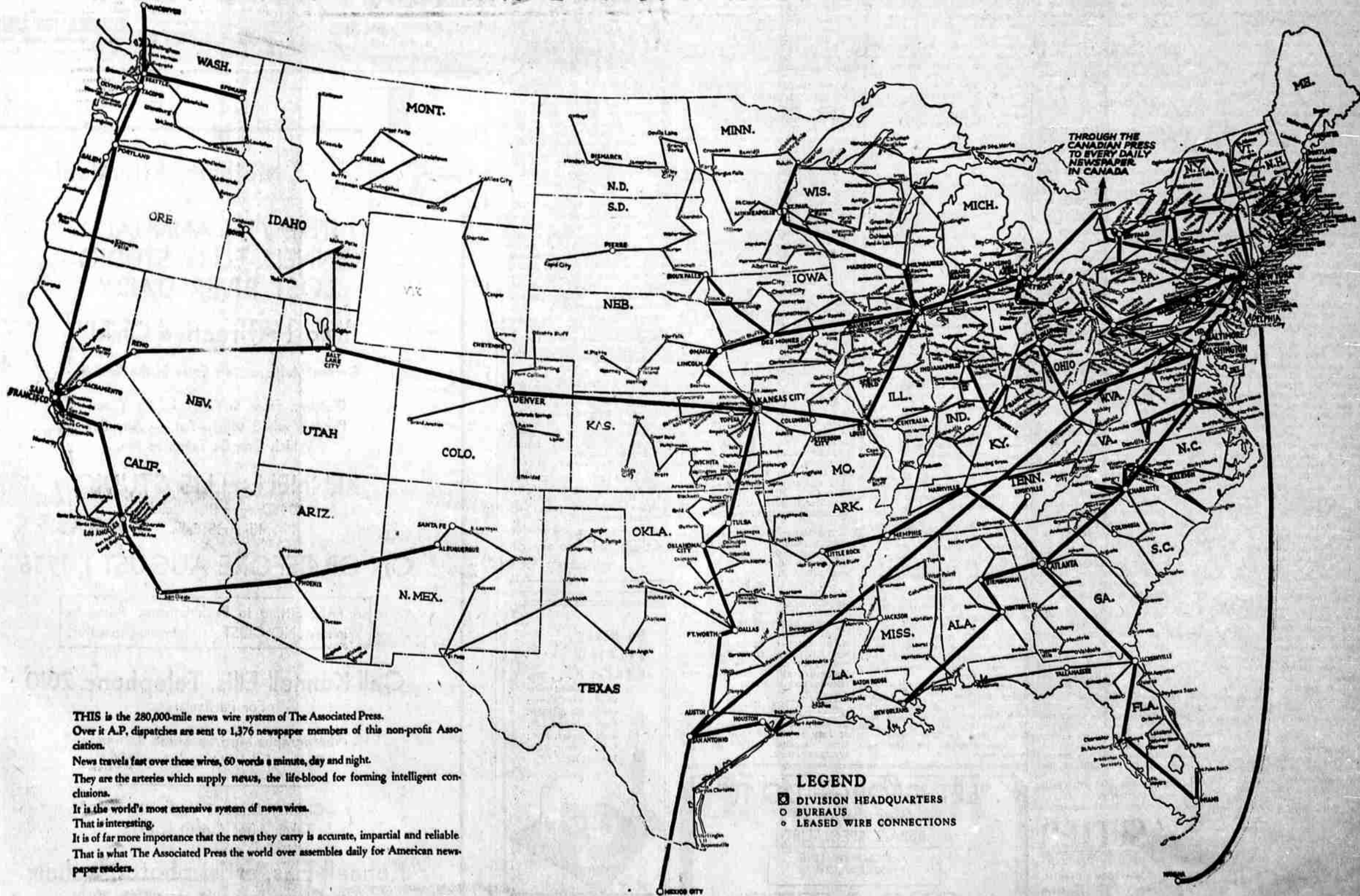
