

CONTRACTS ON COUNTY SCHOOL PROJECTS LET

Work will begin immediately on construction of a junior high school building at Henley and on an addition to the schoolhouse at Bly, following awarding of contracts on the two projects by the county school board Friday afternoon.

H. E. Roskamp will build the Henley structure. His bid of \$17,284 was lowest of four submitted.

Charles Withers won the contract for the Bly addition with a low bid of \$4,490 plus \$150 for excavation. G. C. Motley will install a steam heating plant in the Bly school at a cost of \$19,777. The Bly addition includes one classroom, basement and a stage.

Speed Requested
The school board urged the contractors to post their bonds and get their crew on the job at the earliest possible moment, so that the buildings may be ready for occupancy by the time the county school year opens in the fall or soon thereafter.

Withers agreed to have the Bly project completed by September 7, first day of the school term. Roskamp stipulated an October 15 finishing date in his bid, but in a later conference with the school board, promised to rush construction as much as possible so that the Henley junior high might be ready for use shortly after school begins.

Budget Passed
Before bids were opened on the school jobs, the board held preliminary discussion of the 1936-37 budget.

A delegation representing timber interests of the county was on hand for the meeting and objected to a budget item estimating receipts of \$126,205.08 from the county fund. They held that the \$116,205.08 figure was a decided underestimate and wanted it boosted by as much as \$78,000.

Under the county school system of budgeting, the difference between estimated revenue from the county fund and estimated expenditures is made up annually by a direct levy on the district.

Oppose Higher Levy
The timbermen apparently were opposed to having this levy any higher than necessary. In fact they preferred that the school district should be forced to operate on a warrant or bank loan basis during the final months of the budget year through an overestimate of receipts from the county fund, rather than that it should, through an underestimate, increase the district tax and wind up with an unexpended balance.

The school board agreed to take the timbermen's suggestion under consideration. Another meeting was called for next Wednesday for this purpose.

May Buy More Grounds
A review of the estimated expenditures for the coming school year show that the board plans purchase of additional school grounds. The tentative budget draft shows \$3500 allowed for additional elementary school grounds in Altamont and \$1500 for a football field and playground at Chiloquish high school.

This total of estimated expenditures is about \$30,000 under the expenditures for 1935-36. The decrease is due largely to a less extensive construction program.

Truck Men Heard
Total bonded indebtedness of the district is \$298,024, divided \$221,479 and \$76,545 between the elementary and high school divisions.

After disposing of the Henley and Bly school contracts, the school board heard bids from truck and bus companies on the three new school buses, one large and two small, which the district proposes to buy and put in service next fall.

Chevrolet, Federal, G. M., C. and International bid for chassis orders, their prices varying with the specifications of the equipment, and Wayne and Superior body companies competed to provide bodies for the buses.

The board had not reached a decision in the bus matter when it adjourned shortly before 6 o'clock until next Wednesday.

A physician hurried to the Rascon home to administer aid.

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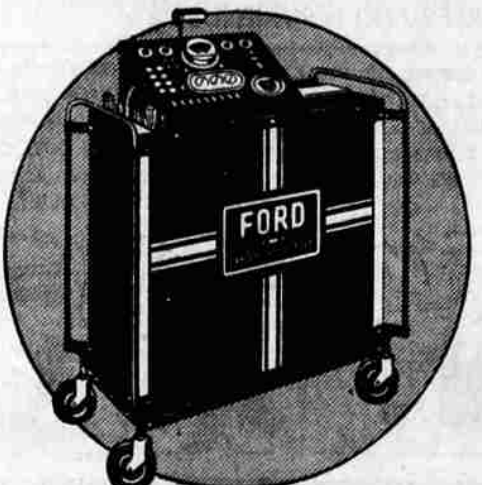
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
