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LONG CRATER LAKE JOURNEY FUTILE

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., July 12, (Special)—Came young William Hayes, 15, after two thousand miles hitch-hiking from Dallas, Tex., to Crater Lake Saturday searching for a brother-in-law, Joe Jackson, whom he thought was working in the park. Two months of thumbing rides ended in disappointment. Joe Jackson was not in the park to welcome his slight, tow-headed kin.

Four months ago young Hayes had a letter that told him to meet Jackson at Crater Lake. With \$1.50 in his pocket, the parentless boy set forth from Dallas, catching rides and now and then obtaining food. His wanderings to the park brought him up into Montana, into Oregon, finally to Medford and then to Crater Lake.

A thorough check of all camps in the park, revealed his was a fruitless search. The boy had lost most of his clothes when his suitcase was stolen near Eugene, he said. In the park thousands of miles from his last home and penniless, he was a picture of despair.

Hungers donated several dollars to him, gave him supper and clothes and arranged a ride back to Medford, where he hoped to find a chore boy's job on some farm, striving in the meantime to locate his kin through the mails.

SEATTLE WOMAN HURT AT PARK

Mrs. J. L. Wilson, 28, Seattle, sustained painful bruises Saturday forenoon in Crater Lake national park when struck by a boulder while walking down the Crater Wall trail.

The rock, which became loosened from the crater wall a short distance above the trail, struck the woman in the leg, throwing her down on the trail. Her head struck another rock, causing a slight wound which required one stitch.

She heard the boulder coming and was attempting to dodge it when she was struck. This is the first mishap of its kind recorded on the trail, 1 1/2 miles in length from the rim to the lake shore. Rocks roll across the trail very infrequently.

She was carried to the rim, three-quarters of a mile up, by CCC enrollees and Ranger Naturalist Gordon Hergness, who was on the scene in less than five minutes after the mishap. The party, including Mrs. Wilson, Mr. Wilson and Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Jarvis, all of Seattle, Wash., were halfway down to the boat landing.

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
