Lynching Checked By National Guard

ANNISTON, Ala., July 14 (UP)—Two companies of the Alabama national guard moved into the Weaver's Cave area Monday to prevent violence to an armed negro suspected of attacking Mrs. Joseph Hill, a white woman.

Mobilization of the troops—a machine gun company from Jacksonville, and an infantry unit from Gadsden—was ordered by Adjutant General John C. Coleman as an outraged mob of 500 searched woodlands for the negro who shot down one posseman.

Mrs. Hill, 25-year-old farm wife, was attacked at her isolated home. Shortly after the assault, the negro shot J. A. Hicks, a farmer.

The memory of Dr. Marcus Whitman and Dr. Henry Spaulding, early missionaries of the northwest, will be honored at a fellowship dinner during the synod, at which time delegates will be acquainted with the plans for the Whitman Centennial to be held at Walla Walla, August 13-16.

Mishaps Injure Seven-Year-Old Boy, Aged Man

MERRILL, July 14.—Accidents in the south-end district brought serious injuries to a 7-year-old boy and an elderly man Monday.

John Fabianek, 61, was literally scalped along the entire right side of his head, when the scaffolding on which he was standing to re-roof his home, broke, and Fabianek was somehow caught on a projecting timber.

Suffering severely from loss of blood, Fabianek was rushed to Tulelake for treatment. Another man also on the scaffolding was uninjured in the collapse.

James Hammond, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Hammond of Merrill, sustained a bad cut over his right eye when he fell from the back of a horse and was kicked by the animal. Stitches were taken to repair the injury.

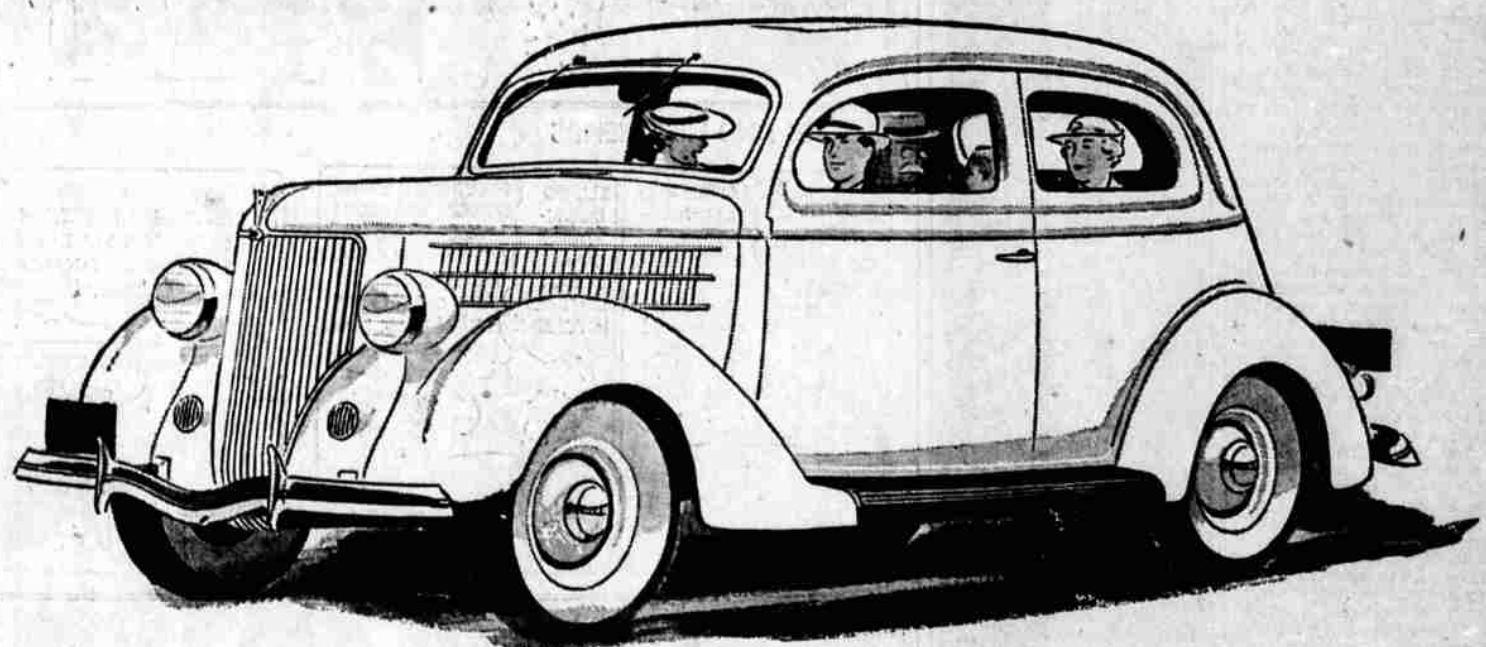
