Praise for service rendered strangers while in Klamath Falls by the police department, was contained in a letter received Wednesday by The Herald-News from G. S. Goshorn, publisher of the Glendale (Calif.) News-Press.

Goshorn's letter, which also discloses the crowded condition of the city during the recent celebration, follows:

"During a recent vacation trip to Crater lake, I had the mingled good and ill fortune to arrive in Klamath Falls during the height of your city's rodeo celebration. It was a pleasure to note the festivities, the attractive costumes and decorations, but it was something of a jolt to discover that your many hotels were filled to the rafters.

"It appeared for a while that the members of our party would be forced to sleep in the street. The hotel at Fort Klamath was full, a telephone call disclosed, and the accommodations at Crater lake were an unknown factor to me.

"I called on your chief of police, Frank Hamm, as a last resort and the chief, despite the many calls on his time, courteously and generously made it his business to find quarters for those in my party, numbering four. He was assisted in the somewhat difficult task by Carl Cook, in charge of juvenile work of the police department.

"Both Mr. Hamm and Mr. Cook reflected credit on the city of Klamath Falls by their kindly consideration of the stranger within the gates and the members of my party always will remember them with gratitude."

MAXIMUM JUMP MADE IN WHEAT

CHICAGO, July 15. (AP)—A maximum rise of 5 cents a bushel in wheat values at Kansas City today accompanied reports that millers there were buying all the wheat in sight.

Paralleling this was a wild flurry to purchase wheat futures in Chicago, but the extreme upturn here was limited to 41 cents. Advances that the Canadian wheat crop was deteriorating at a rapid rate acted as chief stimulus here, aside from the Kansas City bulge.

With heavy profit taking sales in progress here at the last wheat closed nervous, 2 cents to 2 1/2 cents above yesterday's finish, Sept. 1-15, Dec. 1-15, corn 21-21 1/2, up, Sept. 21-22, Dec. 21-22; Oats 14-14 1/2 advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 20 cents.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, July 15. (AP)—Stocks held up fairly well during the greater part of today's market session but generally fell back in the final hour under profit-taking pressure.

While a number of issues broadened the current with gains up to a point or so, and an assortment of new 5-year tops were recorded, the close was irregular. Transfers were around 1,800,000 shares.

It was the largest day's turnover since April 30, last. Realizing was attributed principally to technical factors connected with the recent sharp advance.

The federal reserve bank requirements boost was generally believed to have had little effect on equities, although attracting much attention in the bondroom.

Business and industrial news provided the stimulation for individual shares.
