

## Portland Beavers Nick Mission Reds Twice

### ANGELS' DRIVE MEETS TROUBLE

Los Angeles Defeated By Senators; Miscues Fatal.

The Los Angeles invasion of first-division territory was temporarily halted today thanks to Portland's heavy-hitting lineup and the Angels' own miscues.

The Beavers came from behind Wednesday in both games of a double-header to scuttle the San Francisco Missions 5-4 in 10 innings, and 9-7 in the short second.

At Sacramento, the Angels succumbed to the Senators, 6-5, by reason of damaging errors.

Two Leaders Win  
Seattle and Oakland remained in first and second positions as the tribe defeated San Diego, 2-1, and the Aorns trounced the San Francisco Seals 6-3.

Portland was just too hot to handle against the Reds, tying the score in the ninth inning of the first game on Moose Clabaugh's single, and winning in the tenth on Dudley Lee's outfield fly with the bases loaded.

In the seven-inning contest, Pitcher Nicholas seemed all set for victory as he went into the last inning, but the Beavers' "murderers" row quickly put together five hits, including nicely spaced triples, to score five runs and clinch the contest.

The teams made seven double plays during the day, while 55 basehits were recorded.

Errors Beat Angels  
Los Angeles outbit the Solons, but Shortstop Bob Mattick made two costly errors in the second to help Sacramento score three runs, and four bunched hits in the fourth gave the winners three more.

The veteran Ray Lucas was effective in all but one inning as the Indians edged out San Diego. The Padres bunched four hits for one run in the fifth, but otherwise were fooled by Lucas' offerings.

Wyn Ballou, the chicken fencer, was victim of Oakland outbursts in the fourth and sixth innings to lose a verdict to Jimmy Tobin, who allowed eight hits and struck out eight.

LOS ANGELES, July 16. (AP)—With one loss chalked up against eight wins, Ray Trim of Los Angeles remained at top of Pacific coast league pitching with an average of .889, figures released today disclosed.

Including games of last Sunday, records show that Trim has struck out 31 batters in nine games as against 43 registered by Bill Ludolph of Oakland in a total of 16 games. Ludolph, with 14 wins and two defeats, has an average of .875.

Football fans Thursday were discussing tentative plans to place the name of Ross Carter on the ballot as a candidate for the collegiate all-star team to meet the Detroit Lions, professional champions, at Chicago on September 1.

Carter was one of the leading linemen of the Pacific Coast conference last year. He played guard for the University of Oregon.

The player is a graduate of Lakeview high school and is now living in Klamath Falls.

He played in the annual East-West Shrine contest at San Francisco last January 1.

CHICAGO, July 16. (AP)—The University of Minnesota today held the greatest representation among leaders in the nationwide poll to select a collegiate all-star football team to play the Detroit Lions, professional champions, at Soldier Field September 1.

Six former Gopher players were among the leaders. Close behind were Notre Dame and Stanford, with four each.

Jay Berwanger, the "one man team" from the University of Chicago, topped the halfback candidates with 29,568 votes, forging ahead of George Roscoe of Minnesota, with 28,904.

### YANKS, TIGERS SPLIT 2 GAMES

New York Still Taking Care of Strong Lead in American.

Since figures, so they say, don't lie, all this recent viewing with alarm over the so-called slump of the Yankee murderers' row seems much ado about nothing, despite the Detroit Tigers' sudden surge and the return of Manager Mickey Cochrane to the world's champions.

Cochrane, out for two weeks with a nervous breakdown, came back from Wyoming yesterday, but the only celebration his boys gave him was a split in the double-header opener of their "crucial" series with the Yanks.

Yanks Still in Front  
In spite of their more-or-less battling calmness, statistics show the Yanks are taking care of their American league lead.

Since July 1, when the Yanks' slump was supposed to have started, they have played 500 half-winning six and losing six—which is close to good enough for any outfit sporting as big a lead with the season well into its second half.

Since the first of the month they've been averaging ten hits per game—enough to win ball games in most leagues.

They demonstrated that point yesterday by taking the nightcap of the twin bill 7-4 with a ten-hit attack, aided by a fielding collapse on the part of the Tigers, after losing to Schoolboy Rowe 5-1 in the opener.

Cubs Boost Lead  
The National league lead meanwhile was undergoing a stretching, with the Cubs boosting their edge to a full game by downing the Bees 2-0, while the up-and-coming Phillies pulled out a 5-4 win over the second-place Cardinals.

The Bees not only lost the game, but their ace hitter and first sacker, Baxter Jordan, as well. Billy Herman's spikes tore Jordan's heel open in the fifth inning.

The Cleveland Indians, boosting their winning streak to five straight with a 6-4 edge over the Athletics, moved into third place in the American league, while the Washington Senators, failing before Vernon Kennedy's pitching and the aroused White Sox, 6-4, sank to fourth.

The Boston Red Sox stayed in the second division, although trouncing the lowly Browns 11-3 and 9-1 in a doubleheader.

The Pirates broke even in a twin bill with the Giants, winning the opener 5-4, but falling apart afield and in the pitching department in the nightcap to go down 14-4.

The Reds won a night game with the Dodgers 5-3, with rookie Paches Davis doing some tight pitching.

Swedish Giant Unable to Throw Two Mat Rivals  
PORTLAND, Ore., July 16. (AP)—Tor Johnson, 238-pound scrapper from Sweden, bit off a little more than he could chew last night. Johnson threw Ted Cox in six minutes but failed to make good his threat to dispose of Cox and Sander Szabo within a prescribed 35 minutes.

Sander, a 225-pound Hungarian, not only stayed the limit but had Johnson in trouble several times.

Jack Washburn, 220, Boston, took two straight falls from Harry Demetral, 225, Chicago, and Chief Chiwaki, 240, Indianapolis, Ind., won from Al Peziera, 235, Postul, when the latter was unable to return after losing the first fall.

### Jim Lott Will Oppose Wolfe Tuesday Night

of Alabama, brought here only as a preliminary grappler, this week stands out as the "find" of the Klamath Falls wrestling season.

Short and stocky, clever and fast, Lott gained immediate notice last Tuesday night with a sharp, clean-cut victory over Charlie Carr of Mississippi. Because of the favor the southerner won in that one match, Mack Lillard, the Klamath promoter, quickly boosted him to the main event class.

Next Tuesday night the new star will meet Les Wolfe of Texas in the top bout.

Lott showed remarkable speed, power and science against Carr. Carr himself is decidedly in the division reserved for the better grapplers and recently gave Dube Chick, the unbeaten cox-boy, one of his hardest tests.

The Wolfe-Lott clash has the makings of one of the most interesting wrestling duels of the year. Both are clean, hard fighters. Judging from their showings last Tuesday, they are very closely matched.

Bobby Chick, who earned a draw against Prince Mihalakis Tuesday, has been signed to tackle Hob Montgomery, a rough aggressive wrestler from Georgia.

Carr and Mihalakis will tangle in the opener.

### Trout Planted in Crater Lake Park Streams

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, July 16. (Special)—A total of 75,000 brook trout were planted this week in the streams of the park as a part of a planting program, covering several years, to develop stream angling. At present the main destination for anglers is Crater lake, where good catches have been made regularly this season.

Due to the fact that streams have not yet been thoroughly stocked, fishing in the numerous creeks of the park is not encouraged, although some good catches have been reported.

Later in the season, over 100,000 fingerling rainbow trout will be planted in the lake, adding further assurance that lake angling will continue to be good in future seasons. Raised from five fish per person per day to 12 this season, limits have been caught repeated times so far this month.

Early this week three San Francisco men, R. D. Thompson, A. B. Huber and Charles Myers, caught 36 large rainbow trout in less than three hours trolling.

Over 90 per cent of the lake anglers have been reporting catches, trolling with large spinners, with royal coachman flies attached. Worms have also been used to good advantage.

While shore fishing has brought good results, trolling from rowboats, available at the boat landing, is resulting in better catches. Present angling conditions are a far cry from the early days of the park before plantings were regularly made. Originally no fish life existed in the lake. The first crude planting took place in 1888 when Judge William Gladstone Steel walked 50 miles with a bucketful of minnows from the Rogue river to place them in the lake. Only 37 of the 600 fish in the bucket were able to swim away.

As a result of systematic plantings, begun hardly more than a decade ago in cooperation with the Oregon state game commission, Crater lake fishing is equal to any lake angling found in the west.

Windjammer Races With Broken Boom  
SANTA MONICA, Calif., July 16. (AP)—Buck Jones' Sarrarita, second largest yacht in the California-Honolulu windjammer classic, is racing with a spinnaker boom splintered by a heavy storm, a message to the Associated Press said today.

The movie cowboy, skipping his 85-foot craft, did not give his position, but reported: "Bad storm last night. Waves 25 feet high smashed spinnaker boom and carried it overboard. Took all hands to get it back. It is 52 feet long. Everybody okay and confident."

G. Harton Singer's 86-foot schooner, Navigator, jumbo of the racing fleet, reported her position yesterday as 775 miles from Diamond Head, Oahu. July 4 was the starting date.

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
