

WORK BEGINS AGAIN ON TULELAKE WELL

TULELAKE, July 16. — Once more, after a brief delay, the big bit in the bore of the water well being drilled under supervision of the Tulelake water commission, is being driven into the earth. Operations are continuing under the direction of George E. Hartley, Bonanza, and his four assistants.

Repairs and changes necessary to resuming work have been completed and the drilling tools lightened due to the depth of the bore, now down 730 feet.

Just prior to going into the present strata of green shale, a large bed of quicksand was reached. What is probably one of the most favorable indications of future success yet encountered was the show of water at the 600-foot level, when hydro-static pressure brought the water 33 feet above ground level in the casing raised above the drilled hole.

Gas pockets forced a flow-off for several minutes before the water again dropped. Presence of gas is an indication of water at a still greater depth, according to those familiar with drilling of deep wells for both oil and water.

The well is now cased the entire depth, eliminating any possibility of outside pollution in event water fit for human consumption is found.

Approximately 165 feet of 10 1/2 inch casing is left on the ground.

The water commission in order to meet payrolls and incidental expenses will get in touch in the near future with those who are interested in seeing the successful completion of the project.

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PHEASANTS GROW AT TURKEY FARM

MALIN, July 16. — Brooded under turkey feathers, nearly 200 baby ring-necked pheasants are thriving at the Crater Lake Mountain turkey farm near here and in a few weeks will be turned loose in grain fields of the south-end.

Eggs received from the state fish and game commission, laid at Corvallis, were placed in the electric incubators here several weeks ago and the poulters were hatched July 7.

The young birds are brooded and fed as young turkeys with the addition of meat scraps, furnishing a high protein ration. They will be freed as soon as fully feathered and old enough to rustle for themselves, according to Henry Nichol, manager at the farm.

Nichol plans to hatch and release several hundred Hungarian pheasants next season.

Hatching of eggs produced at the local plant was completed some time ago, and at present several thousand turkey poulters owned by Dr. Dugan, Independence, Ore., are in the brooders.

Thirty thousand will be cared for here. Of this number 10,000 are at present in the brooders and the remainder will arrive in lots of 500 a week.

At eight weeks they will be taken to the rice fields near Willows, Cal., for finishing.

At present the local company has 30,000 of its own birds in pens at the farm, and an additional 20,000 have been sold or are on range on Lower Klamath lake and Klamath marsh.

Injured Man Sets Fire to Bring Aid

QUINCY, Cal., July 16. (UP)—Edward Jack Plum, lonely prospector, set fire to the forest in Black gulch, isolated spot 15 miles northwest of Quincy, Wednesday to attract help after an explosion had mangled his hand and left him practically helpless.

Fire fighting crews, tracing the center of the fire as it swept through the dry brush, found Plum trapped in his cabin by the flames he had started.

He was unable to move by that time and faced almost certain death until the rescuers arrived.

Dore Raps Seattle Industrial Council

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 16. (UP)—Mayor John F. Dore of Seattle delivered a blistering attack on Seattle's industrial council and its "\$250,000 campaign fund being raised to destroy union labor," at the 35th annual convention of the Washington State Federation of Labor today.

The convention gave him an ovation for overshadowing applause for Governor Clarence D. Martin, who preceded Dore on the platform and defended his tax and building program.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 16. (UP)—A filibuster directed by President James Taylor of the Washington State Federation of Labor late Wednesday prevented a convention vote on the hard-fought issue of craft vs. industrial unionism.

Plane Crashes on Alaska University Campus; One Dies

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, July 16. (UP)—One person was killed and two others injured critically Wednesday when a plane piloted by Percy Hubbard, famed northern flier, crashed on the University of Alaska campus near here.

Mrs. Nora Lehto, a passenger, was killed instantly. Her daughter, Betty Thomas, suffered a concussion of the brain and was reported in critical condition at St. Joseph's hospital.

Hubbard's right foot was broken and physicians said he appeared to be injured internally.

The plane was a Waco owned by Dr. Bart Larue of Fairbanks. Hubbard was flying in on a sight-seeing trip over the city when it apparently went out of control and crashed.

News Agency Says Ethiopians Wound Italian Commander

PARIS, Thursday, July 16. (UP)—Marshal Rodolfo Graziani, viceroy of Ethiopia, was seriously wounded when Ethiopians attacked Addis Ababa causing heavy Italian losses, the French news agency, Agence Fournier, reported today.

Foreign residents of Addis Ababa, capital of Italy's newly created east African empire, reportedly took refuge in the various legations.

Harar, most important city in eastern Ethiopia, was occupied by Ethiopian guerrilla bands, the dispatch said, adding that European stores were sacked.

A strong detachment of Italians was massacred from ambush by Ethiopian warriors in the Danakil desert region of northeastern Ethiopia, it was reported.
