NEW YORK, July 17. (AP)—The stock market beat a trail to new recovery peaks today, many issues pushing up fractions to 2 or more points. Highly pleasing business and industrial news, generally, spurred buyers. While there were profit-taking intervals, especially in the last half hour, the close was firm. Transfers approximated 1,600,000 shares. Automobile leaders came to the fore for a while, but fell back later when Cram's estimated automobile production this week at more than 6,000 units below last week's figure. The recession in output, however, was in line with expectations. Sugars and oils developed strength with the technical position of these two industries continuing to display much improvement. Amerasia spurted about 7 points. Ralls led the list most of the day, but steel, copper, rubbers, aircrafts and specialties were in the forward track. The utilities showed little vitality throughout, and such farm implement issues as Deere, J. I. Case, International Harvester and Oliver Farm were weak as a new heat wave swept over the corn districts.
