

ARMY REVOLT SWEEPS OVER PROTECTORATE

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and police commissioners of 45 communities when they refused to acknowledge the movement.

Trains were allowed to pass through the territory, but passengers were not permitted to leave them. All stations were guarded by rebel troops.

Land and sea forces were mobilized today by the government to crush a widespread army revolt in Spanish Morocco.

Warships were dispatched to the area to aid air forces which bombed rebel strongholds. A number of generals and officers in Spain were arrested in connection with the uprising.

The government announced the revolt was "broken" after it had been forced to take "radical and urgent measures in the interior."

Madrid and the remainder of Spain, so far as it could be learned, remained comparatively calm during the disorders, but authorities took strict precautions to preserve order.

The constitution was intended to curb government enterprise when the government hasn't got enough patriotism and courage enough to curb itself and remain within constitutional limitations. Without the restraint that it embodies the constitution would be a worthless piece of paper."

"Patrick Henry, if he were living now," Glass asked, "could he go along with the vagaries and whims of impractical academics, some of whom never did a day's work or earned a meal by the sweat of their faces? Henry's whole life was an absolute contradiction of that sort of thing."

F. R. Sails Off Canadian Coast

ABOARD SCHOONER LIBERTY OFF CAPE SABLE, NOVA SCOTIA, July 18. (AP)—After a bit of fishing off the southern tip of Nova Scotia, President Roosevelt set out today in the schooner, Seawanna, for Shubenubet, about 35 miles up the east coast of the Canadian peninsula.

The sailing, Roosevelt, in jolly mood after a spectacular 36-hour run from Seal Harbor, Me., to Cape Sable, Nova Scotia, are expected to lay over at Miramichi, then head back up the coast toward Campobello Island, New Brunswick. There the cruise will end July 28.

CONVENTION KEEPS CLEAR OF POLITICS

put to rest when the convention sent the "common cause alignment" resolution back to committee.

"This resolution appears to be full of dynamite," said Dr. Townsend. "I should like to see this resolution referred to both national boards for careful consideration."

The doctor said the resolution might be taken as having the convention on record in endorsement of "this candidate and that candidate," and that it required further study.

After some discussion from the floor, the convention adopted a resolution that "whereas there remain in certain isolated cases, endorsements for congress which should not have been made," the board of directors would be authorized to review endorsements and perhaps withdraw endorsement.

There was considerable hubbub on the floor. "I'd like to know what method you are determining whether those who are voting are delegates or not," demanded one delegate during the confusion. "Everybody's hollering."

A man in the far gallery was trying to explain a point of parliamentary law to the chairman.

Smith Gets Cheers
Gomer Smith came across the platform back of Townsend and sat down. Hundreds of delegates stood and cheered in an ovation for him.

Several delegates came to their feet to endeavor to appeal from the chair's ruling that the resolution had been adopted.

The chairman went into a huddle with some of the others on the platform, then announced that another very important matter should be taken up and assured that the resolution would be returned to later and "dealt with in proper manner."

Norman Thomas Speaks
Norman Thomas, socialist candidate for president, told the convention he did not come before them to ask for an endorsement of his candidacy, but to tell them about the principles of his party and its relation to Townsend old age pensions plan.

He added that it was entirely proper the convention had agreed not to endorse any political party or presidential candidate.

The delegate gave Thomas a great round of applause as he appeared on the platform and they applauded again when he said "security for old age is a magnificent program and one which I can endorse."

Thomas declared the states are not big enough to grapple successfully with poverty in the United States. He criticized the republican and democratic platforms for their stand on social legislation.

"I have the right to appeal to

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you to help us enact legislation which the American people believe is necessary for their well-being," Thomas said. "You and I know we live in a country where poverty is unexcusable."

"We are promising you no distant land in Utopia," shouted Thomas. "There is a lot we can do for men and women now. We can promise that if you will organize you can win abundance. You can carry out the dreams of the patriots. But it is a job to be done. We don't think that can be done by the proposal so dear to your hearts."

When Thomas announced he could not endorse the Townsend plan he was greeted with a chorus of boos.

It was necessary at one point for Dr. Townsend to step to the microphone and ask his followers to "please be courteous to a man who has invited to speak."

"It is too bad you are not using your magnificent enthusiasm to bring about your real emancipation," said Thomas.

Before the convention opened Dr. Townsend told newsmen that he would press his demand for the removal of Gomer Smith, Townsend vice-president, after the convention was over.

CLEVELAND, Saturday, July 18. (UP)—Leaders of the Townsend old age pension movement today dodged the issue of whether Gomer Smith, their vice president, should be evicted from the organization for an angry speech in which he endorsed President Roosevelt and criticized policies of the movement.

No Action Yet
The board of directors, after a five-hour meeting, adjourned early today and announced that "no action had been taken by Dr. Townsend or the national board to censure any of the speakers that have appeared."

Earlier Townsend had said he would not sit in any board meeting at which Smith was present.

But a committee of the board of directors succeeded in persuading him to rejoin the meeting and try to solve the serious situation that had arisen in the old age pension movement.

CLEVELAND, July 18. (UP)—Dr. Francis E. Townsend stalked out of a meeting of the Townsend recovery plan board of directors Friday, announcing he would not return until the members decided whether to expel Gomer Smith, vice president of the national organization, because of a speech he made yesterday endorsing President Roosevelt.

Gomer Smith, a member of the board, was present at the meeting. Also in attendance was the Rev. Gerald L. K. Smith, who was the target of Gomer Smith's attack yesterday. Townsend has demanded Gomer Smith's removal for "raising a controversial issue in the convention."

PUBLIC HALL, Cleveland, July 18. (UP)—Hot heads and partisan political orators were rebuffed Friday at the national Townsend convention as Dr. Francis E. Townsend tried to get his old age pension ship back on a steady keel after a day and

night of controversy which threatened to scuttle it.

Father Charles E. Coughlin, Detroit's radio priest, who tried to lead the delegates into Congressman William Lemke's union party with an arm swinging, ear splitting speech yesterday, made a "demagogic appeal," according to Nathan Roberts, southern Townsend regional director, who was appointed to pour oil on troubled waters.

Legal Action
"This movement must be non-partisan," Roberts said. "We do not subscribe to branding as a liar, double-crosser or a betrayer a Roosevelt, a Landon or a Lemke."

Those were the words that Coughlin used in describing Mr. Roosevelt when he stripped off his coat and went out to try to bag the Townsend votes for Lemke.

Two blocks away in Cuyahoga county's great, stone courthouse a deposed Townsend leader and three active California delegates were starting action to oust Dr. Townsend and his directors and throw the organization into receivership.

Ask Accounting
The suit was started by Rev. Alfred J. Wright, ousted Townsend northern Ohio manager, and three delegates to the national convention from California.

They also asked an accounting of all OARP funds in excess of \$1,000,000 and impounding of books and records.

Named defendants besides Dr. Townsend were Rev. Gerald L. K. Smith, heir to Huey P. Long's share-of-wealth organization, and Directors John B. Kiefer, Dr. Clinton Wunder, Baxter F. Hankins, Frank A. Arbuckle, Gilmour Young and Roberts.

Rev. Wright was ousted after he appeared before a congressional

committee investigating OARP.

Smith Gets Stay
In line with this policy, Townsend granted a stay of execution to Gomer Smith of Oklahoma, vice president of the Townsend organization, whose head was supposed to have been chopped off today because of a speech he made yesterday.

Smith, who defended President Roosevelt and criticized the Rev. Gerald L. K. Smith, a rising star in the Townsend movement, announced they would have to kick him out; that he would never resign.

"I am still vice president of this organization," Gomer Smith said. "I am still a delegate to this convention. I am going to take my seat in this convention and see what happens."

Oklahomans May Bolt
Nothing did. Overnight cooler counsel prevailed when it became known that Gomer Smith had considerable following among the delegates.

"If they kick Gomer Smith out they will have to kick the whole Oklahoma delegation out," said G. W. Mayberry of the Oklahoma delegation. "There are plenty of people who agree with me, too."

That word got back to Townsend, who insisted that Gomer Smith was going to the chopping block but that the ceremony had been postponed. It may not be performed until after the delegates have scattered and the Townsendites are no longer in the hot light of national publicity.
